magazines. We sympathise with those
readers who find that a portion of the
story they are reading has been cut out
of the page, but unfortunately can do
nothing to remedy the evil. This mutila-
tion is the work of the Customs Depart-
ment of New Zealand, the reason being
that certain advertisements are considered
objectionable, and removed before being
allowed on sale in the Dominion. Owing
to the American practice of placing read-
ing matter and advertisements together
the result is that portions of stories or
articles are destroyed. So it is either a
case of taking the magazines in this con-
dition or discontinuing them altogether.

Owing to pressure on our columns the
Editor has, this month, relinquished the
space usually taken by him.

The next Conference of the New Zealand
Library Association will be held in Wellington
from Tuesday, February 16th, to Thursday,
February 18th, 1937. Special attention will be
given to the needs of the medium-sized and

A most interesting and indeed fascinating
book.
