

The Roman Wall.

On Jan 13 I left Heswall about 11 & motored up the Wirral.
I went O'Kelly Rd 12.5 ft. a. Stockton. I have had been a
good deal of sand but it was hard & I was rather clumsy. After
Clay Bank there was a steep. I had some trouble in the car
down Stockton Road about 3/4 hour to wait for O'Kelly's train.
He had packed the luggage in & down to Dukerun & then
turned off at Wilton Gilbert & walked down to Rivington
Hill. There had been a good deal of snow as soon as
got to the high ground there. He went to the Hydro at
Heswall & had tea & expected. I went down to
Heswall about 6.40. as he had come from Oxford.
The next day (Tuesday) it was rainy, so we went to Heswall
Abbey to spend about two hours there seeing out it, & amu-
taining it. We then drove to Collyer & saw the remains
but decided that the wall was too high & too large
as it was so wet. We drove up to Heswall & saw lots of
the remains & up the wall on the way to Clevedon.
We had lunch there & then drove to Clevedon (Cleves) &
saw all the excavations there & went up the hill to Heswall
& then drove back to Heswall & got in about 5.

Well Jan 15 was a fine day, we drove to Clevedon & took
their car. Mrs & O'Kelly were in it & I followed in mine
I left mine at the School there first after where the
"Wade" Road leaves the wall. We all three got into the
Clevedon car & down on to the "Twin Brewed"; the
drivin took us up the side road near to the gap. We then went
back & began to walk along the wall back (L.) to my car.
The gate at Peel Bay is wider than usual & one could see the line of
defence. The outer edge of the wall there is about 500 ft high & down to
P. Stairs & up the steep ascent & down to castle back. This is
one of the "miles" castles. The walls are half thick & 60 ft. long & 9 ft. high
still remain. The castle is 50 ft. from E to W & 62 ft. N to S.

hill & Sleet Rigg. The wall borders close all the way except
that in the gap it does. Part of which depends on flat stones.
The Slemby is very unique - steep bank cliffs to the wall - a
large shallow lake - clay high - & extremely high. We descended to
Hulking Gap when there is a stone wall across. Then past Hotbank
farm. The water & farms the wall starts the wall is in.
Then an Holbank farm. Down Robins Gap & an orchard clay
Then the Heswall Castle, the most famous - an app.
In my case the original fort has been walled up when the
farmer was released & they brought all the signs of capture
& destruction. There also a wood & h. Roman camp.
This we already been built before the wall as the wall is to N.W.
& N.E. towers are rounded into the wall. Places of the barracks,
& a watch house visible. On the south of the fort - we evidently
& settlement of Celts followed. One of the stone towers from
was going up. In the fortways the first tower & chariot
ruins were visible. We walked down to May Queen which flows
through the wall, then Bay gap - the widest - open in this
high part. There arched of going up the Slemby shield
we walked down across the river to the car & down home.
The road very hilly. Road was very bad & one had to
be careful.

In the Hydro we met a very elderly man Jimmy Lows
who had begun as a Cobbler then being a prize fighter & a promoter
of fights & was an apparently wealthy businessman & entrepreneur
in Liverpool. He was ready "to play the last game"
that year. Club of course is legal. He always fell
& O'Kelly who helped him a lot, remained son of
his generation.

On the Sunday he moved to Greenland in Halkinville & left car then
he was fortunate in being able to "graff" a van which took us to
the "Twin Brewed". We walked up to Peel Bay gap & then found
after I went in there white shield when the fort was 125 ft. above sea
