The first ¹¹⁵ ~~100~~ pages are devoted to holiday trips in Europe, mainly in Switzerland & Austria. There is probably quite a lot of interest to people who have done mountaineering there.

Then follows 8 pages of shipboard routine en route to N.Z. At Lyttelton he was met by the Rev H. G. Hawkins, then vicar of Glenmark, whom he had probably known as a fellow clergyman & fisherman when in N.Z. 30 years previously. Glenmark Vicarage was Newton's base whilst in the South Island. The following 40 pages are a record of a 5 months visit to South Westland with a double crossing of the Southern Alps; the return from the Hermitage was over Baker's Saddle of which he had made the only previous crossing in 1902. Later in the season he was a member of a party flown by Captain Mercer into the head of the Arawata; details of this will be of interest in years to come when Mercer's exploits (such as landing on river-beds and cattle-filled paddocks) will have become legendary. From the Arawata the party made the first ascent of Mount Eros. Throughout these months in Westland, Newton was in daily association with Peter and Alec Graham, and this Journal contains much of interest regarding these famous mountaineers. At the Franz Josef hotel, in alpine huts, on glacier expeditions and bush walks, he met most of the active climbers of the day and he records conversations with many of them; a number of the controversies of the day are touched upon and there are some delightful anecdotes. Newton's party met an English mountaineer who was striding along a bush track wearing only a hat & shoes; when he caught sight of Newton he stopped and put on a pair of shorts and only added a shirt when he realized that Newton was followed by some ladies.

In 1935 South Westland was not exactly a paradise for motorists: Newton had brought to N.Z. a car which was then far from new and much of his time was spent in effecting running repairs, with a number of trips to Hokitika when more serious breakdowns occurred. Much of these records will be of value in years to come. Hokitika and Ross are mentioned many times and Newton records visits to old identities whom he had known when Vicar of Ross in 1902-07. He spent much time with Dr Teichelmann (his climbing companion of his youth) and Mr Herman Osmer who had helped with packing of stores on early explorations.

The rest of the book is devoted to newspaper clippings: articles & photographs relating to the history and mountains of Westland over a period from 1906 to 1938. There are several pages from "The Press" in 1906 about the habits of keas. From Church magazines come long & interesting descriptions of journeys to the Far South undertaken by the Revs. J.R. (later Archdeacon) Young and A.K. (later Bishop) Warren.

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The ditch appeared in the gap as in every gap. The Vallum stands best near Wadi road & is very well seen from Wadi shields. The gaps on the line are called "locks" first Green Lock with traces of British dwellings then Ashes Lock, then Shield in the Wall & mile castle then Dog's Gap & a Paw Gap & a wall near this to the north & Wadi's end. Then Bloody Gap & Thruway Gap then Campfield with castle & a gap recently named Pilgrims Gap. Then Campfield Pearly which he destroyed a good piece of the wall. A Road runs thro' here & the Hatteshill Down a low Down as it called N. of the Wall runs thro'. There are traces of a Roman Water Mill at the bend. There was a Roman fort here which was dismantled when Alsace was built. A small farm house I found on the left. Along the wall ditch remains N. of the wall was a large empty Roman Camp & a road in extent. Great Chester is soon reached where the foot of Alsace is low. The western facing is very fine. The Roman Stonegate was thro' the foot. Wadi was long to the foot of a long winding aqueduct 6 miles long from the head of low Down. The wall appears in the plantation beyond Cook's mound. Still further on. The near Alford farm to the north of the highest of the hills north of Strickwell 860 ft above the sea a wall tunnel in good preservation stands just where the wall down. Wall then joins down in below. Signs of the King's Well are seen where the water flows in the gap. It is said some King & his men were besieged here by Danes. We left at first below the crest of the hill & then took to the left & came down to Greenhead of Wadi & followed the town path & came down to the road & got an car & drove home.

On the 14th July we drove this Chatterfield & along Wadi's road to get a fine view of the wall. At 6 Greenhead turn up to Gilstead where we called for letters from the Birdwood Camp. (Dorchester) (Amboylamer) I then drove down to Laurence Piny & saw the river & then up to

Devoeille where we saw the really magnificent view in the valley of Alford with some of the old stone walls to 664. We then returned back to Corbie & had tea & went out to find the measure shed. Saw both the night train to Oxford & O'Kelly & I stayed at the Camp & later Hotel - a very good.

On Sat. O'Kelly was off to see the museum & set off to drive home. Not being satisfied about a train in the car, I stopped at Perwith & found the cream wheel & chimney of the differential had gone. My head & shoe & I was on the road again in 1 1/2 hours. I got back to Hatteshill for tea after a most delightful trip. I got back to Oxford but his wife was locked down & a motor like that - a pleasure & a car but a cruel & cruel.

The Roman Wall.

On Jan 13 I left Keshmully about 11 & motored up the Bilsdale
 to meet O'helly at 12.58 at Stockton. I have had been a
 good deal of sand but it was hard & I was without chains. After
 Clogh Bank there was no sand. I had some sand in the car
 deep Stockton I had about 3/4 ton to wait for O'helly's car.
 We then packed the baggage in & drove to Dubeau & then
 turned off at Wilton Gilbar & walked across to Riding
 Hill. There had been a good deal of sand as soon as we
 got to the high ground there. We went to the Hydro at
 Hexham & had tea & unpacked. I went down to
 meet Howard at 6.40. as he had come from Oxford.
 It was very (sunny) it was raining, so we went to Hexham
 Abbey & spent about two hours there seeing it, & was
 interesting it is. We then drove to Colliery & saw the church
 but decided that we would not go to *Crofta Cristophorum*
 as it was so wet. We drove up to Hexham & saw bits of
 the wall & on top of the wall on the way to Chollerford.
 We had lunch there & then drove to Cullinstown (Cleethorpe) &
 saw on the excavation there & went into the museum
 & then drove back to Hexham & got in about 5.
 Wed Jan 14 was a fine day, we drove to Chollerford & took
 their car. Low & O'helly went in it & I followed in mine
 & left mine at the school house just after where the
 "Wade" Road leaves the wall. We all three got into the
 Chollerford car & drove on to the "Jurie Brewe", the
 driver took us up the Fiddle Road way to the gap. We then went
 down bank & began to walk along the wall back (E.) to the car.
 The gap at Peal Bay is wider than usual & we could see the line of
 defence. The lower clay of the wall there is about 54 ft high & then to
 Peal. It is up the steep ascent & down to the hill. There is
 one of the "miles" castles. The wall is 7 ft thick & 60 ft circumference
 still remain. The castle is 50 ft by E & W & 62 ft N & S.

Some of the foundations of the wall are found at Cullinstown. There are another
 hill & Sleet Rigg. The wall has been built all the way except
 that in the gap it is built with stone & rubble & found at Peal.
 The scenery is very wonderful - steep, bare cliffs & the wall - a
 long shallow lake - very high - & excellent views. We descended to
 Peal Bay where there is a station with cattle. Then past Hot-Bank
 farm. I have seen a farm the way that the wall is in.
 There are Hotbank Crag. Two Robinow Gap & are Cuddery Crag
 where the Huns seized Nible Castle, the most famous - on left.
 In every case the original gaps had been walled up when the
 farmers were released & they brought all the signs of capture
 & destruction. There are a wood & the Dorewinium Camp.
 This was evidently built before the wall as the walls on the N.W.
 & N.E. corners are rounded into the wall. There are the barracks
 & a watch tower with. On the south of the fort was evidently
 a settlement of Roman followers. One of the stone towers found
 was fairly perfect. In the gap way the first tower & cleared
 ruins were visible. We walked down to King's Down which flows
 thro' the wall, then Bay Gap - the widest opening in the
 high part. I then decided of going on to Peal & seeing should
 we walked down across the fields to the car & drove home.
 The road along Wade Road was very good & we had to
 be careful.

In the Hydro we met a most interesting man Jimmy Laws
 who had begun as a stone mason being a huge figure & a number
 of figures & was now apparently running a business & entertaining
 in Newcastle. He was reading "The Glory that was Greece"
 & had read Plato's *Republic* in English. He says he felt
 that O'helly who helped him a bit, & answered some of
 his questions.

On the Sunday we motored to Greenhead in Halkesville & left the car there
 we were fortunate in being able to "jump" a van which took us to
 the "Jurie Brewe". We walked up to Peal Crag Gap & then turned
 left & went on to the station when the fort was built 1250 AD. The sea

July 29. I left Halesbury early & caught the 7.40 in Galt & got to London about 11.30. I had to go & buy in two arrears. I got back to Victoria & had lunch at St. Andrew's when O'Malley joined me. He caught the 4 o'clock train. There was much a good roll on the boat but we got across without mishap. Now if an inquiry straight (Sunday) around the hand luggage need be from the Customs. A man came down the same train & asks respectfully if there is any thing to declare. We had the first Chemist. O'Malley had a sheep. There was a woman & her son in the carriage with me, but it went off & got the carriage to myself.

July 30. We got to work & showed Bala & some breakfast & caught the 7.50 got to ^{Platz} D. about 12.30. We took our luggage up to the Post Office. The shops were shut 12.30 - 2 so I was unable to change money. We had a hurried lunch & got the Lockhart and the Zwick & unpacked. Weather rather dull.

July 31. We were called about 5.45 & got off at 7.30. Just when we left the road we found a car that had caught fire & burst itself up the night before. We followed the track to the Schwarzthum & stopped for food 8.10 - 8.40 & got to the top at 11.45. It was just what a cool day, we had a little sleep. There was a fair wind, we went back slowly & got to the Hotel at 2. After a change of sleep I had some letters & then went to bed.

Aug 1. We were called at 5.30 & got off at 6.30. Just before the road crosses the stream we went off from left & a little below a triangular stone about the level of the road found a faint path which took us round with the Grindelwald valley (on the left is a striking line to the river). We were at Grindelwald at 9.30 & stopped for food till 10.30 & then went on & got to the Hotel at 12. The hotel is fairly "wristle" after some food we had a sleep. We walked a narrow gully

with the two little lakes but he did not catch any thing, but he had caught some small ones earlier.

Aug 2. We got off at 6.40 & went up the green ridge W. of the lake. We had a little cooking. The usual route is on top of the Oberrain shelf. However we got on the glacier higher up & had a short walk across to the cut in the E. ridge of the Grindelwald which we reached at 8.30. We went on to the cut at Valtoggin at 9 & had food being at 9.40. We went down & then rather hurriedly a skiing trip went past the cabin and came up to the N. Peak of Pig Vachet - 3226. I went up the ridge by the glacier was a little but then up between the two peaks going to the top at 11.10. After a rest we went up the South Peak of the Vachet - 3221 which we reached at 12. We left at 12.15 & were back at the Valtoggin at 1.10. After lunch we left at 2 & were back at the Hotel at 4 being tired & sleep on the way down. The weather looked better now.

Aug 3. A hot morning. We got off at 8.15 & went up the green slope E. of the lake & then descended along rising slightly. We got to the Radmer hut at 8.45 having got a little too high. Just before the last rise we went to get on to a long grass covered old moraine which had the track - if you climb on trees up to some angles among boulders. We went down & saw a scene after walks keeping fairly close to the wall of the peak on the E. crossed the glacier & found a small path that eventually joined the Schwarzthum path just before it dips down to the Flühli road. We were back at the Hotel at 11. After lunch we packed & slept.

[In the ascent at some of the Schwarzthum path felt the fall of a stone man on the left. From the stream of Grindelwald follows the glacier about 1000 ft. If unable to cross the stream follows a faint path beside it to the large open field.

here bear sharp left & keep fairly close to rock wall which runs up to the the unnamed peak & E. of the Rademacher

By picking over rock there will be no snow walking.

Aug. 4. I got off at 8:30 & walked down to Dava^{day} which I reached at 10:35 & got on bus to Davao City. I changed money, bought a climbing belt & saw a few things I would have liked to buy. The 2 o'clock bus up. I really had the baggage ready & we went on down to 5:30 & got the train to Zambo. We joined some baggage to Pambasin & went on to the "Paland Bar" Campsite below some way from the station where the auto starts in the morning.

Aug 5: In early AM the 7:30 bus had taken an unusual detour. Our baggage was there in time, & then if we could get it in the auto. However all went well. Unfortunately it was dull & soon began to rain. The driver was able to put the load up while the car was moving by putting in a clutch. It was evidently very fine country - it is all the National Park but we saw but little of it. At Santa Maria we changed autos & got a cup of coffee. The weather was a little better now than at Zamboanga. The Station Customs demanded one passport but they asked if we had anything to declare. We had lunch at 1:30 and took the bus when we changed to an Iloilo auto. We arrived down to Davao getting there at 2:30 & had a heavy lunch of the auto at 6 to San Carlos. We stayed at the Hotel Clementi very comfortable.

Aug 6 In get at 6:15 & went up opposite the hotel & at 8:45 we on a well walked flat. & had good bearing at 9:50. We made a mistake here. Either we should have gone up a steep slope in the opposite corner & got on to the S. W. ridge & followed that or ~~turned~~ back on to the A.S.S.E. ridge & going well up & keeping away from the crest & then followed round on a more or less level path E. of the ridge. As it was we went up to this ridge & climbed up 500 ft. & came to get fairly

high. We got to the top of the ridge at 11:30 & followed in a zig-zag. I looked down in front of me but descended some 400 feet to the CR. So we turned back & keeping well below the ridge on the E. found a good route down & turned one of a little camp of canvas & got back to the station at 3:10 - a nice little camp for food. We had a snack & then at 4 got back to the Hotel at 5:10. (It might have been better to have left the station & followed a track to the Chabel high up in the W. of the valley & from that have walked up the CR. The S.S. ridge is best reached if going from the highest Chabel on the E. of the station & walk up to Camp in the sky line (in air R) & then follow the crest till we come off near the level of the surrounding flat - come E. of the S.S. ridge which lead to the CR between 3175 & 3200 feet.)

Aug 7. Wet morning. Took out the car load to Zambo.

Aug 8 rained all day.

Aug 9. A better morning. Took lunch & went up along the Garcia road to the Park di Vaca's turned back & going gradually from the Davao & came to the path up to the Pambasin camp & down it. (Note: Pambasin is straight beyond the hotel from the main station & across the stream to the ridge & a sign post is seen, a good one. Slip-trick lead up.)

Aug 10 Everything was smothered in just a few. So we decided to go on. I went to Zambo at 5:30. We took a private auto Pan di Vaca & left at 8 & got to Park di Vaca at 9:30. After a fine drive, with a very steep descent from the Garcia we walked for the auto, but it was full. So we took a private auto to Fucine & then got ^{a fine} another auto to the Hotel when we had lunch & then took a private auto to the ^{Grand Hotel} Pambasin. He had plenty time to unpack before dinner. We asked for guides for the Pambasin, but the man would not go & the other declined to Ping to go ^{a guide} for us to meet us.

Aug. 11. As it was so late, the guide had us turned up till 10.30
 we asked to be taken away about noon, however when we got
 down for breakfast he got the 7.30 bus, the second
 waiter did not leave & there was a mess. When we got to the
 bus it was full & he had to take a few more outside, some
 Germans were going down the road with them. But the
 time he had found a guide it was getting on so as I was on
 to San Stefano & wanted to leave them & did as of 10.30.
 It is a steep path up & the guide would rather just
 for us. He called at Nalgio Mendic for food 12.15-1 & then
 went on. He both felt the heat very much & programed
 of numerous balls & got to the Presanella bus at 3.30.
 It was supposed to hold 7 & there were 9 of us & two guides.

Aug 12. We got off at 2.5 & followed various grass covered mountains
 Presanella. I got with the hall for food ^{6-6.30} ~~6.30-7.15~~ we then went up the
 rocks. In the ridge there is one little place where we
 chopped down some kind of D. g. with a little bit of
 grass down. We got to the top at 7.15. I had seen
 his position was also there. It was a glorious day & a
 wonderful view. There is a little hut on the top a
 bit of tree wood. We were of course in that part of
 the top of 1. 1915 had belonged to Austria & all along
 the frontier there had been heavy fighting & all the
 fields were covered with the remains of mules & all
 barbed wire & shell cases & "telefrigos" we left
 at 8.30 & got down to the mountain at 8.25 descending
 of the sand & to the bus at 10.40. We had a meal &
 then set off down. When we got to the road we had a
 drink of tea from the Germans & got to Poggio at 3.40
 & paid off our guide Colliani Corrado & took a private
 auto up. When I got back I found some letters
 waiting for me & on looking one that had come
 off his bike & broken the handle & had.

Aug 13. We had breakfast at 9 & then left. After lunch at the
 public bus was again full to both a private one to Poggio.
 It turned being in the afternoon.

Aug 14. I woke up at 4.15 & we got off at 5.30 on a fine morning road off
 by the Val di Genova. We got to Poggio when the bus had
 been rebuilt & was on a little other job 8.40 - 9.30. We was
 on a road that the bridge had been carried away. We found
 this very shady little bridge across the river & crossed it
 then & some other saw a paper bridge. We got to Carate at
 11.20 - 11.25: to Bedole at 12.15 - the Carate Post office is
 being rebuilt. I had better not sleep & was on till
 1.5 when we had a glass of beer & had food till 2.5. It seemed
 very like rain but just held off. We got to the Madonna at
 3.30. The old bus has been destroyed & we were in a old
 bench with a little bit more for weeks. We had some
 food - had soup with uncooked rice. It was very nice.

Aug. 15. I had a very bad night. We got off at 3.10 & was
 on till 4.40 when we decided to leave as he was still very
 unfit. He was straight in a day & had a bath 7.30 - 8.10 when
 he had a little sleep. He stopped near where the bus to
 the Presanella bus for up & had food. I had some of the
 Church of San Stefano & saw the process - a dance of
 death & some of the churchmen & his fellows & the
 down to Poggio at 2.30. We got the auto up at 5.30

Aug 16. We packed & went to bed.

Aug 17. It is I will be here at 6. Communion was fine first.
 Another priest was celebrating & the parish priest was
 unwilling a small by seven from the Valley. After the
 gospel, the parish priest came in & read it in Italian &
 proceeded to preach while the other priest went on with the
 mass. He kept an eye on the celebrant while preaching
 and stopping to let the people standing at the end of the church
 for not coming up & sitting down. When the saying bell rang
 the service ended abruptly.

he got engaged a paleo 1st off at 7.30 & followed the
Jacobell way & then turned on the Green's way & went
past a house that is being built & stopped for food on the
works soon after he got on the snow 11.50 - 12.50. He walked
& passed carrying down the Campanile Pass (a Gray's)
he soon got to the hut & the Reverberans (Rappia
Pachotti) at 1.20. This unlike the mountain was
nearly completely covered. He had some food to sleep
in the sun. There was a fine view of the Reverberans
& the Colina Dolomiti & the Marmolada.

Aug 18 he got off at 5.00 & followed a track round till he
Camin Jose got on the snow & then on the works & up the chimney
he went on a bit & then had food 7.40 - 8.10 got to
the top at 8.40. It was a narrow ridge & rather a
cold wind so we stayed 5 mins. & went back
we got to the Reverberans - the highest of the two peaks -
at 10.40. He had some soup & wine & left at 1. He had
half an hour halt for tea & got back to the tent at 6.30

Aug 19. The public hotel as he could send one baggage round to
Eckers a small cabin Paro di Segno so we packed
& planned to go down to Pagnolo & to climb the Care
Alto & then go on to the Rappia di Cuchetti on the
Lobbia Cchi Pass & then to the Adornella & down to the
Jacob Pass. But the Arab people absolutely refused to let
it. So in a hurry as the weather did not look too good we
decided to go round with it & caught the 2.30 Arab

Sande
he got off at 2.30 & caught the Arab to Fucine & changed
Arab & changed again at Paro di Torre. & went on to
Eckers. He was very crowded for Paro di Segno. It is the
same company but it is apparently advertised as a
third class but there are three different charges.
We stopped a little way at Eckers & then at Borgo Cuchetti
& were quite comfortable.

Aug. 20. The Arab is an adventurous & stout at 6. but he was assured that
it did not start till 6.30. He was ready at 6 but it did not
leave till 6.30. I saw on the Arabia & the records on the
7 rains. He passed a chamois when they were using flails
he had a brilliant view being some 2000 ft above the snow we
took the out of the Domini he had a view & had lunch at the
Clementi & then up to San Calisto again. It was rather
cloudy but we engaged a guide Vostorilli Philippo for the
next day. When the Arab had on the snow they are
kept locked & the guide's name is by which they are not

Aug 21. he got off at 6.45 & got to the top of the snow in his tent.
& had a snack of food & went on at 8.5 - being to the ridge

he halted for 10 mins & got to the tent at 11. The Arab
Nevie Dereveni is kept locked & the Hotel Clementi

not get in. However eventually by using some of the
wire breakers Arab he forced the door & got in. & had
food. Soon after another guide arrived with the
proper keys, sent up of the tent. The Arab was
supposed to hold 7 but there were 11 of us in it.

Fostorilli's elder brother came up with the key - where
second guide had come up with the key, I killed his
brother better than Philippo. The Arab's guide was crude.

Aug 22 After a small cup of coffee he got off & got to the top of the
Dereveni at 6.40 then to the Doss again at 7.50
on the works he had some food & got to the top of San
Mettles at 9.5 & left at once. The guide said
that the snow on the glacier would be soft so we
traversed the high land near the Dereveni & got back
to the tent at 12.45. He found the Arab full of

"New" unpleasant party from kitchen who had come up from the Garrison
The date of the trip was bettered with packed wine & bottles
Culprini & "Telefonia" he left at 2.40 & got back to the
Hotel at 4.45.

Aug 23. We caught the auto down at 7.30 & got to Iruia just
in time to catch the 11.25 train. There was no stop
except at Campolongo, where I really got out & got
some bread & sausage & wine. We got to Portofino
about 2. I walked up to the Steinhilke where we
found the luggage we had posted from Genoa
They were full at the Steinhilke but got rooms for us
at the Palace. I went down to the Clemente
after tea to try & find the Ostman, they had
left a note he was out.

Aug 24. I went to the Celestini at 8. We went down
the tunnel with the Ostman & did odd jobs.

Aug 25. We got up at 6.55 & caught the 6.55 to
S. Morio & took the new cable railway up to

Pigi's Ear. Chiantarella & on to Corchia elev. 2,200 meters.
We left the station at 8 & heading below the
Corchia and struck across to the north
We walked for food just before the Schivo lake
By the lake is a club building belonging to the "Tras Fiumi"
Club. We got to the top at 10.30. We then circled
round so as not to lose sight & went up a gully above
Opposite which goes through the path from Sarnadun
just W. of the zigzags on the S.A.P. map. It was then
11.30. We had some good tracks & got to the top at 12.30.
It was a glorious day & a most wonderful view. We stayed
there till 1.15. At 2.15 we were at Fontana Fronda
& had food. We left at 3.15 & went down & were getting
to Sarnadun at 4.50 & just missing the train
We took our auto up to Portofino

Aug 26. The Ostman asked us to go fishing with them, so we joined
them early & went down to Portofino where Ostman got a permit
to work on the Pesca & had lunch & took a boat. I know for
sure 1/2 hour & then Ostman told me. I then Ostman
came in & he & I held the boat till about 4. We were
very good & run. However it was very jolly & the Ostman
was in great form. We went back to the hotel & had
tea & then motored back to Portofino

Aug 27. We packed & got off at 4.21 & went to Spezia where there
is a comfortable little inn Panni Sarnadun.

Aug 28. We got off at 6 & walked along up with heavy loads
We got to Alfa Sarnadun at 8.10 & had food till 9.15.
As we passed the higher Chab they asked us to take
some papers up to the hut which we had been given up
in July. The hut is visible but after climbing
the cones & can't see it with a telescope & the hut is
behind it. There was a series in it a man
& his wife & their son. We had food & the
jackets & saw returned from Pigi's Ear. We slept
& checked gear.

Aug 29. We were up at 3.30 & off at 4.15. The track leads straight
to the end of the lateral moraine of the glacier descending
behind P. Piccolo & Pedale. Celestini. The map shows all the
E. of this moraine & has glacier. This would be the glacier
and extends to about the level of "Pigi". We kept to the moraine
on its E. bank rising as we went & got on to the ice about the
2850 level. In the descent we kept to the ice. In the
Cany morning the level might well have probably used
crevasse, but with the snow we do not get high enough to the flat
level. We got on to the ice & found good snow &
useful steps when we began the ascent. We found the
the "L" "id" of Celestini & there was no doubt about the figures 3120
& then went & then on the left hand N & went to the little
well peaks visible from the hut. Pigi's Ear was visible

There two rock ledges are the ridge that lead on to Pig's Head
 there is then a short descent & up the rocky S. ridge of Pig's Head
 we got to the top at 7.5 & stopped for food till 7.40 & then went up
 the ridge where necessary on the W. side & got to the top at
 8.5. Again a most glorious view & Pig's Head is very well
 situated for view. We left at 8.25 & got back to the head-
 at 10.30. We had food & slept at 11.50. About 200 yards
 below the head we fed up a stream in a cloud 30 yards off.
 We got to the half-Sarcelle 1.25 & had a drink of tea from
 the stream & left at 1.45 & got to Spina at 3.
 We had tea & had a shower & camped at 5.12 to Berg in

Aug 30. We had a check day, & in the evening arranged with a
 friend to come up to the Alla Andon in the night. There was
 no church at all, the village church being rejected.

Aug 31. We got off at 6.30, the track soon becomes very
 all the way. It is all these trees till after we are below
 the "Schepkulle". Just beyond that we halted for steam
 & had food 9.10-10.15. About 2.70 one bus to
 camp but to go to the right. From the front at a
 good path lead to the Alla Andon which we reached
 at 11.30. There were 4 men there & a party of 6
 who went off after lunch. We set camp in the tea room.
 Later on a Swiss from Davos his wife & another girl with
 a guide whom he recognized as the "Pony" we had seen
 fall pulled into a crevasse in 18.15 arrived from the Alla
 & later two men who had a pair of sties on the other party
 & were often told of it.

Sept 1. We got off at 5. From the Post-Rohnd a ridge runs up to
 the Saigebach E. ridge & up this a track goes but it is
 a very loose track & at 7.50 we hit the rocks we reached.
 We started off & went up some grass & then found some grass
 high up to this track, I could see to even down
 all sorts of ways & we went up rather to straight following

Saigebach

5 miles of easy ledges. at 7.40 we were just below the ridge & halted for food till
 8.15. We followed the ridge till we came to the face (VI)
 of the Saigebach. A crevasse gully lead up this face. The
 snow is thin & in small places, a little like the snow on
 the east of Shandbell's chimney at Babelstoe. An outcrop here is a
 good belay for the descent. We got to the top at 10. The view was
 very fine. We left at 10.40 & at 12.10 were below the chimney
 & took off the rope. We came down another chimney, a little
 easier, but the snow was scattered in some places &
 I had to protect myself when I stepped to new.
 We went down & only leaving the ridge before the place we had
 reached it on the ascent & went down the gully path.
 We got to the head at 2. After food I slept from 4-6.30.
 One guide H.S. Christ arrived with new food.

Sept 2. We got off at 3.50. The guide got a good rest till the
 snow & we got to the col close under Alla at 6. At 6.15-

Pig's Head
 Alla
 We started up climbing rather back to N.E. following
 Caeris. We halted for food 7.10-7.30. From the head we
 came up on to the ridge looking down into the gully between
 the two peaks. We went up this & worked up & down &
 got to the top at 8.15. Percy had come up to the head
 & we watched him following. When he got to the gully he
 climbed up to the ridge but followed the ridge up to the lower peak
 & descended into the col between the two peaks & so to the
 higher peak. We left at 8.45 & went back to the little
 col between the two peaks & then worked to the E. edge of
 the Alla & descended part of snow & part of rocks.
 After we had descended to the head of the big crevasse we
 are left. I noticed a path below on my right. But the guide
 told me to go to the left as I was obviously &
 present of it. I found in me that he was going to take us
 down of the old rock under the crevasse. As we got down
 the crevasse there was a good deal of water in the
 rocks & he generally insisted on my climbing down

the waterfalls till I was fairly well. The last part of the descent was unpleasant & I did not descend again. I had several descents but it got to be too far from Puy de Sancy. I went to the R. & got a small chimney & a small house. He got the top off at 11:10, at first he took the R. & then took the left. This is a steep path & is visible from the ridge descending from Puy de Sancy on the left. This path had several times been to the school teacher. On an descent we saw a chimney among the trees. I then went to walk from the glacier till we got down to the lake and path & then down it when we came to a spring he got down at 3 & looked the lake & left at 4:15 & got to Reims at 5. I should have seen the lake from here but I did not see it & came to the hotel at 8:30. He left his "book". He had been suspicious that he did not know the way up & on looking in the book he found it was his first ascent & all about 6 years ago & a guide.

Sept. 3 I packed & caught the 12:15 train taking my trunk with me. I changed at Clermont & at Lyons & had to wait on the train at each. I had dinner on the train & got to Paris at 9. And had difficulty in getting into a hotel, but got into the Hotel.

Sept. 4. I had breakfast at 9 & went out to the R. & saw the museum & the pictures & the museum which had a very good collection of minerals of different periods & the Spaltenstein. I was in the zoo & dinner at the hotel. I went on to the station & got an empty carriage. High haze on the lake. A beautiful night.

Sept. 5- got into the hotel, good crossing & got breakfast & caught 5:39 & arrived at St. Helens. A trip of walking from the station after the day 10.

After I left St. Helens we went to Paderborn on Sept 4. We took the Dover line & in Sept 5:40 went up to the top in 5 hours & down in 4. The descent from the top. The descent was easy. At the top we had the Mount Rose at 3000 ft, & up to the Paderborn line & after a good day we had lunch on Sept 9 & in the Silberhütte & on all the tops to the Paderborn & down to the summit. On Sept 10 we took the train to Paderborn & down to the summit.

1831

Mon. Aug. 1 I loaded 2 yaks to Lalah at 7.40 & when I got to the station, I found that it was no of the train suspended for Dansk Holiday. I got breakfast at the Hotel & got a train which landed me at Kung & at 1.5. I went across to Victoria & found all the shops shut. I had a walk to get the train & was Dansk Holiday & had means to see about on a two things. It was very clear in London he had quite a long crossing, but I survived. I had a carriage to myself & had a good night

Aug 4. I stopped in London & got a few things that I wanted & changed some money & was on to Zantabunum & first missed the train up. It was full & was sent off. At Museum I found O'Malley on the platform. We went to the "Jungfrau & Victoria" & had tea & unpacked.

Aug 5. He got off at 6.45 & was up behind Museum instead of bearing down into the Schilthel. He crossed the Schilthel of a Conspicuum glendamm & sidled round till he gained the usual path. We stopped at the Glaucanti 10.15-11.15 & had food & got to the top at 12.20. There was a fair cloud up & it was a beautiful day. He left at 1 & had some good glisade down & then came down of the hegethel, stopping for tea by the Egertel bush. So on on to J. He then went down and as it looked like rain he took the train down from Almsentel & got in just before heavy thunder came.

Aug 6. Had to Church at 8 am. Oh Jello. passed. packed & sent off to Ried. Walked toward Gummis old & returned for tea. Amundsen in evening.

Aug 7. Had morning packed the rest of our luggage, decided to go Jungfrau at 1.35. Walked at the Schilthel in climbing things & got to the top. Stopped at the J. mission house & got at Bergheim. Soup for 2 pines & cheese 7.50. 10% reduction S. A. S.

Aug 8. a clear night; had clear in morning up 3.20 off 5

There is no way out of glacier this tunnel as the Jungfrau side. We got down to the corner of the glacier at 7. & saw a party of guides bringing the notes of two young Swiss hunters on the Zentabunum. up to the Jungfrau got to the top at 7.20. & got to top on our 3 legs at 11.45. There were several parties there mostly passing thro. I found my electricity local had run down & that I had left my sweaters at the Jungfrau. I sent a p.c. & it was sent on to Fivemay.

Aug. 9. He was called at 4 & as the weather was bad went back to bed. He got up at 8.30. There was great snow all round, and party went down to Ried. Leo Stein had come up from Ried. He spent the day in sleep & meals.

Aug. 10. a foot of snow round the tent & still snowing, a party came up from the Concordia at 11 & got off at 12.15; he got round the corner & opposite the Concordia at 2.45. The new snow masked the latter. Victoria's crevasses were had to go carefully. at 4.15 we started he started on & walked in to the medical museum & followed it down. 4.45-5 he had a half of the Margela see. in crevassing by snow. I had my shoes fall out. He then went on to the right bank & found good going in the ice near the bank.

Below the hutted Almsentel we got off & found a fair path which led from a steep side (Zentabunum) about 2.15 it was getting dark & the path led round the bluff where the ice fall begins & on to the main beyond. He missed this & climbed right up to the old Blomhinsens. It was fairly dark & we decided not to look for the Anli & descended first of all to the path & then down & sleep from 1.45 to 2.25. It was fine night but a cold wind. He had collected a little dead wood. It was on 8. pm. he had plenty of milk & very small butter. He had tea & food. I missed my sweaters he had a dry shirt to put on. He then of a did much except occasional dogging. He had tea at 12 & 12 when he got too cold. & from 2 on kept a small fire burning which kept us warm.

Aug 11. He had breakfast at 4 & got off at 5. following the path down to near the old Almsentel, then took to the ice & found the way off, which was then been very difficult to find in dark.

1931

Aug. 11. We found it a long & weary pull up to Belalp which we reached at 7.30 just as it began to rain. After breakfast we had a sleep & another after lunch.

Aug 12. We got off at 7.30 putting our luggage to Arolla & walked down to Brigas. I changed my shirt & stockings at the station, while three Maquis & his Devan Drom & a west woman named Muroch appeared. They were off to Zermatt. We went out to see the lake & then to the station & took train to Naudy, then to Schemm & out up to Finney stopping at Hotel Caran.

Aug 13. A fine morning we left at 5 & had up to the P. museum that with heavy loads getting them at 6. After lunch we had a sleep. There were good many up. I went further and climbed the Coulin & Corbassins & then was off for it. The Coulin itself had not been climbed. We decided to go it next day.

Aug. 14. I had evidently got a chill & was suffering from diarrhoea, and got off at 2.15 & was in bed at 4.45. Went out into the town, but all the shops were shut - got the 3.30 and up to Handover. We stopped at the "Les Handover" first class & good food, & very cheap. As the sun is the first mountain it is convenient for getting luggage off. The other hotel is named of the village.

Aug. 17. We got off at 7.40 after having our luggage sent off; the old hells which cross the stream at once is carried away landslides. We had some food had our breakfast & then went for about 1/4 mile. We had a good dinner of Macie & got to Arolla (the tolls) at 10.15. We had Solly first-classing. Mr. Wedgwood & his wife & a boy (Anglo-Scottish & P. member of the Ladies Alpine Club) & Rutter & his wife & children were in the hotel.

Aug 18. We got up at 7, it rained to rain before we got off, it rained all day. We read & slept.

Aug 19. We got off at 8.20 & set off with 2 days food for the Belalp. We had & had till the "Lacels" we got to the P. road Belalp at 11 & had food & left at 12. The road to the lake had changed as we were in a big "hot" place in the glacier below the lake. We got to the lake at 2.30 & had food. & came for Zermatt & 10 pm Arolla.

Aug 20. A bad night. 4 inches of snow. We left at 10, we soon got below the snow & had a day. We stopped for lunch at the lake water on the path about the lake. A thunderstorm came on & we got in fairly late.

Aug 21. A wet morning. As the clothes were wet. I put on my tent clothes & got them & got my trousers very stiff. After lunch we walked up towards P. & got to the lake. I broke a tooth & arranged to go to Sion for dentist & telephone.

Aug 22. I got up at 9.30 & off at 5.20 & got to Handover at 7.30. I had a "Cape" & got the 7.30 and. It was very cold till we got to Sion as we were in shade. I took my alarm watch to the museum as I had stopped it. Got the watch cracked at a cost of 50 fr. had lunch at the station & caught the 1.10 and got to Handover at 3. As it looked like rain I did not stop & got to Arolla at 5.20 & had a bath & sleep before dinner.

Aug. 23. Sunny. Went to the S. am. Cathedral & to the museum. Had lunch & slept & went to evening.

Aug. 24. Went up the P. lake glacier with Rutter & his boy. A little snow. Saw some fine avalanches.

Aug. 26 Went up to Ziguinore plain with Mr. Dullage & the son had lunch & came back for tea

Aug 27. Had breakfast & sent luggage off & left at 8, got to the P. Cam de Dault 10:45 had a quick visit & left 11:15. We found 6 miles of mud sand since he had been up but fortunately sled had been made & it was cold wind & we got along comfortably & got to the hut at 1:45. Miss Wedgwood & two guides & a dog Roy & his mother came later, & in the afternoon a woman guide with a man & a girl. No tracks to Mt. d'Heure

Aug 28 A fine sunrise & beautiful morning light, we got off at 6 & went on good snow for the D. & D. Doreguelais watching the other parties going to the Za, we got to the foot of the way up to the Mt de Dault. Dr. Doreguelais. The whole place was surrounded in mud & sand & we had a little discussion as to which was the best way up. We went up & sleep sand at first abt. 6 p.m. tests, then he found the mud sand on sand snow & later ice & had to clear it away & clear - as he was afraid of no return, as there was no union between the two layers. In places it was a foot deep & powder sand he got on to same rock. 8:30 to 10 & had a sunset & then sat standing on till 10:40, most of this usual in clay rocks. He was now well up & could see the ridge of the peak. It was plastered with ice & chert but seems possible so we returned & got down on to the flat at 11:30. Aug 31 Off at 10, glaucous & cloudy hills, along road to first large bridge, sign post to Topali hut, up steep path through trees came to water & went to bridge where the track crosses to the right bank of the main stream; we returned on slope about 100 yards to spring & had lunch 12:10-1:45 we went down to camp, it began to rain about 3 & we huddled for bit & then went home

Sept 1 We had arranged with one of the K. albae altars, but he came up to say it was wet, so we slept on. After lunch we took train to Jaisalmer & met Mr. Zemelt, had tea, did some shopping & returned to train.

Sept 2. Informal expedition engaged as Zemelt, so we got Karl & started at 7:10. The Dampier is a very isolated look & I stayed for a night in the day & arrived there last. It was unpleasant as the key to the pen and I sleep of the Val of Guadalupe. After a Sunday morning of 1892 it was a festival of the Umbra.

Aug 14. I left my bag at the hotel from working & got on back to Guadalupe. The anti on the Mt de Uas was full so I shared a private anti with a man to St. Paul de Abayo. It is a fine view on the Mt de Uas. Several arrivals in the day had crossed it on the way to St. Paul. From the summit of the Mt there is a fine view of the Aguada & Bca de Chembeyron. I got to St. Paul de Abayo about 11:30. The hotel which my previous room & pet's doghouse was full - all meals and a small bed - good restaurant. I got - Dampier - Aguada & Dampier who kept a small inn. Chay Dampier - on the telephone & worked a man. After lunch I left off in the heat of the day to walk up. I had to go there all day long in the cold weather to get my things sorted as I was very hot & tired. I followed the road to Petito Sereeno, I should have turned off.

at Les Bains & being on the left side the houses crossed the river & followed a path through the trees with a head on the east bank till about the bridge for P^{te} Sereuse. As it was I followed the last & along road & crossed by the P^{te} Sereuse bridge. I began to sleep ascend & at the end of the second level I saw a path leading ^{parallel with the river} N. I should have taken this, but she instead followed the better path & found I was getting to Le P^{re} crest. I passed one Chab^{re} climb the path & then followed on to Le P^{re} crest & found a track that lead me back, but was too high. I got on to the ridge & looked down at the valley, I followed a good track & a cross & then came down to some meadows below when I saw see a path to cross via the miller I took bridge above the church. The track for the miller lead down into a clearing to the east & Sereuse & on by the river & got to the stream & then followed a track on the E. of the stream & had a little difficulty in getting on to the top of the bluff to the north of the bridge for de Sereuse. On my return I kept to the left bank of the stream & crossed at Les Bains & a small place called way. The difficulty is to get from one level to the other, then I had to draw a line 200 ft. above the stream, as soon as possible after the bluff, & walk this the field. I had tea in the valley & got to the miller I find it full of Chasseaux alpinus & algerinus troops. However they got me a complete "commodore", "Chay Daulen" is a very modern one had the food & wine was good. I got talking to some of the Sereuses & found them very pleasant.

Millers

Aug. 15 I got up at 7. & waited for hours. The priest arrived on a mule like he had forgotten the key. I did not get off till 8-30. The path goes up half way between the highest level of the village & the bridge above the one of the church. It is steep, where there is a white "Sertin" (white stone from Meudon). There is a small cave to the right. The path then traverses high up on a line on the level

There is no water. I got to the level "Jean-Louis" at 12.50. It was filthy. I know my stream which flows all over the place. It is open & used by people coming up to fish the lake who have fish all over the place. Blanchet's path etc are under the stream in a locked compartment. I looked on level up had food to sleep. Some time & Sereuse came in who had climbed the "Dree". I showed them "Ball" they declared that this is was 1895 it was better than any guide they knew. I had food at 7. a strong wind.

Aug 16. The guide who is as like to leave his wife for the night with all the Sereuses came up at 4.20. Left off at 5.10. Got to the level at 6.15. He took me up the rocks ^{well} N. of the big church. There were no water. All along just a sloping way. He walked down to the big church & at once on the wall of it at 8.10. Under the stone of level it is quite impossible. He had food & left at 8.45. The climbing was no easier. The route at the W. of the volcano. He had on a wire ladder & got to the top - climbing under a rock with the last chimney & got to the top at 10. It was a glorious day - the day before there had been a good deal of cloud. He found Corbi's cave of 1873. He left at 10.20 & went down. He had food 10.30-11. He then descended of the level he had come up & walked down to the big gallery church which is situated where there is a fork. The first is level & the second ascended of level, the ridge is marked in a stream bed on the N. side back to the ridge again. Walk along, open N. side, to the low gap. I had an early start & no candles began up all sides of the Bee above head day. I think I should have been very tired if I had tried it. I tidied up the bed & left at 6:40 & got down in a little on the line. Had a wash & food.

Aug. 18 I got up at 6 & packed & left my baggage in the care of the Hotel & went to work the 8:10 and got to Paris. It is a very fine & nice town the Canal & G. Miller. I got to the Canal at 10:10 & walked round the Algeirs Canal and across the stream & found water & had dinner & cleaned my ammunition & camp & washed a vest. I got the boat down at 3:15. It was very full & in the end I had to sit on the side of the boat. At G. Miller's I was on the station & found the boat full. I got my washing & caught the 6 train to Rouen. The P. L. M. had a good and expensive. I had a walk & dinner. Got train "rosy" & large wine.

Aug. 19 up at 6 & off at 5:50 of anti-b. Lileprich. When I arrived there was "no room". I could find a friend at the end of the train of 6:50 arrived. I arranged my baggage & had off after lunch at 1:30. I was well & good but got very slow at the end & did not get to the bed. (Label Le Maccin till 7:15)

Aug 20 Algeirs 3:15. Arrived at 4:35 & y. pipe & tobacco & had a little off till 4:35. At 5:50 we passed on the top of the little station. The guide led us & then up rocky walls

to a confusion of shells with 65 new shells. We reached the 6:15 & left at 6:30. We got into the sun. I found many rocks with agate like boulders. The rocks were very tiny & I got 7 new & 8 new. There I had some food 9:50-10:15 & fell better & as the peak was very low & in front of the I decided to go on. We were on the top at 10:40 a fine view. At 11:00 we got to the snow shoulder at 11:45. Left at 12:40 and at the bed at 12:50. I paid off the guide & had food & sleep. I intended to sleep tonight at the bed as they told me there would be no room but they were wrong. At 4 I was advised of three of my things from Miss who arrived. The weather looked bad in the west & at 5 I set off, thinking a bad day, was to better than a day. I had a fine spring where the steep part of the path ended & had tea 6:10-7:15. I turned along to the Hotel Algeirs at 8:10 and got dark. There was an unexpected bed at the Hotel. After dinner I turned in. The left the guide both behind & found the old fellow had

Aug 21. I had felt suspicious & changed with great suspicion. There was a good morning, I found that the bed was to be used was occupied for women. I understood the town & there I had changed & went to bed at 8. The silk vest was used as a "covering cloth" & passed along of such convenience. As I know the snow should be after putting it on the altar, I did not know of it of course. I had a program at the Algeirs evening named Bode. I had seen him this night at Val Gardennes. He wanted me to go up to the Paris Hotel with him, but I had arranged to go down & also felt he was meant to go for me. I took the anti-dust L. Agreant in the Bisse - all the road side & the mountainous places were blue with wild lavender. & purple. Sept 1.

The train was 40 min. late. I had lunch & Dinnings & went up into the cabin. Well worth doing as the juxtaposition was in excellent preservation & the pieces must have been unrecognizable before Hudson's rebellion. The streets were narrow & very steep. But it was not. I got back to the bath & a change & dinner. At the bath office I was informed that the work for the Laurent was worked up. I found out afterwards that the work around the way had not work for part of the journey before hand.

Aug 22. Left at 5. Rearranged baggage & found the boys & G. G. G. of train. Came down at 7.40 & found there was plenty of room in the auto. After a scramble I got ^{with} the boys & started off of train "now accompanied" by G. G. G. & took the train & my sack with me. I had no time for breakfast, but had had an early cup of tea. It was a fine drive indeed. At the Laurent I had coffee & eggs & left at 10.10 & walked round in the level. I got to the house & to bed at 11. & I stopped to admire the house. The path is now apparently kept in good order, the "Sauter des Crovanes" being all Sauter & no Crovanes. I heard of some water & had lunch, then during a good many people on their way to the Chablais & I'Alpe & back left & was on getting there at 2. I had coffee & cooked & bed. I had not had in the sun & cleaned aluminium things & had sleep & tea. All the parties had fine & an Auto Drive from Geneva arrived a pleasant couple.

Aug 23. I got off at 5.10, the Drive couple had breakfast at the Drive house & got off ahead of me. I saw some steam again. They are going over the Pie de neige Corda the Puy de Cassin. The path keeps to the left of the stream till after the rise in the valley when it comes to the left of the Cassin to the left of the Laurent. The path comes to an end & ascends steeply to the right. I got there at 7.10 had some food & left 7.45. When one reaches the stream there is a cañon cross as one & work up rather to the right. no. much path to show

on reaching the crest of the left boundary of the stream cañon begins to show again. The path would practically straight up - so as to be hindered of sheep, water esp. to the left. - After a bit the "mass" in the ridge to the E. of the crest is visible, the path works across to the ridge & round finally by snow to the crest. The crest is just on the edge. I got to the crest at 2. I had a tea & then the crest - snow was to be melted there are various stones but of the little fragments. There is a sheet of snow (that snow on, but it was cleared) when I arrived. I had food & sleep a party of 5 arrived at 5.30. Rain & hail & thunder came on. It rained before leaving in I saw three stars.



& had tea. It was a fine day with no wind & snow.


Oct 14. I took a small stream & the museum & some bread &

So I went to Beynac. I hung about till the post came in about 9.30 & got off fairly about 11. As I got away there came a little rain & I took a photo of Beynac from the train. I walked in & crossed the railway bridge & went to the manor of Puyguier. There was an old chateau up on the hill, but the new one boasted that the new look down on the road of Beynac - as of the 4 first lord - colonies. On the first of the 17th the lord of Puyguier attacked him & destroyed his castle. The present building is of the 18th century. Unfortunately the tower was then too small and not in. I walked in St. Pierre & had lunch with some wine & a bottle of water & then got to the garage & supper at 12. I had some coffee. It is closed from 12-1. So I had to have a drink. The garage is a large one in width & in depth. I was lazy & took the left down, then we walked along a passage beside a stream. With the wet weather it was pouring down & I was glad to be covered by caps. There we got out & had a walk along a lake at the end there is a natural bridge. We got out & walked along a bit presently we came to a sort of waterfall & a boat below but there was too much water in creek to get in with the tackle. We went up to a higher lake. The St. Pierre & St. Pierre are certainly very fine. It is an enormous part of the lake. It has been explored for about 3-4 K. but part is dangerous & only one can only go by special permission. I took photos of the town & the Paul Valadier & saw the Roman Arch of Diana & got a post to St. Dom of the Cathedral. I was a part of Beauvais. When the Post came down from Beauvais I saw a man who is known with some a chapel near the St. Dom, he was accompanied by a boy in red cassock. While he was getting the Beauvais I saw a man with the "umbrella" & was told it to be a part of the Beauvais carried by the boy. He was up for a part of a "Prière" in the lake but I saw. Feb. March 1933 Skiing in Arlesheim

Feb. 22 I left Haringae at the 11 o'clock train, after having a boat pulled the day before & an x ray which showed that the dislocated bone in my jaw was not clearing up. I went to Detken & was tried on a get my skiing coat in which I had had 3 ip fastenings put in the pockets. I had dinner with the Danish members of the S. H. at the Hotel Central Hotel & caught the 11 o'clock train from Victoria for Fochberg & down to Hagen.

Feb. 23 It was a pretty rough crossing, but I had a comfortable night. The ground was all white with snow, I passed Neuf & I was busy at 6:00. I caught a train in 1-3 and stayed at the Hotel Stadt of Post in Waisenshausen. Comfortable & cheap.

Feb. 24 I took my ski to Frijol (Lena) and tried to find on Lena. I wandered around the shops & came at 9:14 & got dinner in town & got to Landeck at 9. I went to the Hotel Post.

Feb. 25 got to the 10 o'clock train up to Gallen. It was a better cross as the sun had not got down to the valley. At the Hotel Rosse I got word that they had telegraphed that they had no room. However they promised me a room in the hotel that night. After dinner I went out to work & up to the shed down. Edward & I were arrived at the 4:30 train. He got a room out.

Feb. 26 he went off after tea to the Alp Hotel, in the descent a heavy fall I broke a ski. Edward had a repair outfit. He went down to Kope & fixed the ski & came back very slowly as the first part of my ski was wobbling badly. However it held on till I got back just before 6. After some coffee I bought a pair of ash ski for 4.50 Schilling.

Feb. 27 he reported yesterday's run, Edward gave back the top again. March 1 Ash yesterday, I went to the main may commencing, the seeds in the cloud had beautifully covered seeds, but not ash.

Alp hotel - Edward was on & climbed the Dreiloch Schige & I was down to Kope, & then returned together.

March 2 he packed & got used to the Haringae slopes. Edward sent off his baggage at 11:00 when the trains were. We worked on ski & bought provisions.

March 3. Skied some. I took a parcel to carry my sack. We got off at 8:45 & got to the Madonnenhaus at 12:30 & had some food leaving at 1:30. I followed slowly after the others & got to the Breibadener Haus at 4:30. The run was pretty good.

March 4. A fine morning with cloud about, we got off at 10 & went up the left hand of the glacier. Drizzle came on however we got to the Feuerschnee & Camp at 1. It was a little cold & after a snack he returned got back to the Hotel at 2:45.

March 5. A better looking morning, we got off at 9 & went through the Vermaas-Funkel, but returned without going to the faulted in the afternoon, he packed & had lunch & then the snow came on.

March 6. About 6 miles of new snow had fallen, however we got off at 8:30 & got to the Obere Oberramschnee at 10:30. He started up the Dreiloch Schige Edward & I went to the Schanze. About 11:45 we set off down waiting for a guide to show the way then the ice fell. I had some delay at the top. My ski began to ice & I had to slip & was down. I started at 12:45. Had some food Edward went up again for the run back. Met two by the name of Guiniers & Deubans both ex heavy men.

March 7. Offer of roof the Chalaischnee. he had to take me ski off for the first week. Edward went up to the top of the Aepfelmatten, I turned back. He returned on the same side to the Feuerschnee & had a half of some food. He left at 12:30 to the Hotel some after 4. He found after work that a

Datchman had been ill on a climb & died that night in his sleep.

March 8. Off at 10 in thick fog & I got to 1:00. He followed some tracks which led us through the Feuerschnee & the Schanze.

he asked in way - whether of us unfortunately had a compass, but he had realized from a necessity of some kind that we were being led off with the direction pointed at; he got on to ridge which I seemed to be the divide as he wanted to go to the Heilbrunn and with the friends that I saw some people skiing down so as had come to their tracks & followed them down in descent after some time he had a guide who told us he was one of the famished sleds. He went - then crossed a salt-spring ridge & there parties in the Jakoboch track. After some time we left at 4. on an icy track & got back to Gallen at 5.30. Fortunately we got two mattresses & I had a better sleep than ever.

Nov 9 After some shipping Sibirian sleds for the Heilbrunn track when he was by air Gammier & Deubum for the Heilbrunn and Captain. Rob. Facka. He collected them & left to the Heilbrunn. I packed & left my things to be sent off by Coak & team. With letters and a sled team. It was thawing hard & all the drainage from the two sleds had melted. I saw a girl come down the steep slope of the channel & fall with an awful sound of liquid measure.

Nov 10. Off 9.30 up L3 Gammier trail 11.20. Coffee left 12.30 It was very hot, ^{cloud} ^{1.40} ~~at 1.40~~ I saw a Russian for sled & a German Doctor came up & collapsed with a heart-attack. I gave him brandy & sugar. His wife had chrysitis. Others came up & evidently a party of six ^{the last day with him} I went on at 2.20 & got to Heilbrunn track at 4. The place was packed. I managed to get 35 birds "lagas" at 6.40 Edward & Gammier arrived both tired. Deubum had gone on to Hig-bach from West. A Party of 20 has been up 12 days, after dinner by some says

Nov 12. I got the matter for the night. I saw Edward off & said good bye to Gammier - to a party down the Heilbrunn track & I should have hurried his way & got into bed & back over. I got off at 11.20 & went sleep up towards the Junggulle, but I found a lock & was to sleep. I got back at 7.15. There was a number of wrecks & ruined trees in the bed.

Nov 13. A party of Germans asked me to join them but I went off alone & climbed the old Heilbrunn ridge & got back alone. There was a very amusing crowd of Germans in Meidum Laga.

Nov 14. I got off at 8.20 & started to go on the shoulder of the Junggulle to the Heilbrunn. One of my skis broke & I had to patch it with a boot-lace. I had to descend about 500 ft. & got to the Heilbrunn at 12. It was very wet & I set off again at 12.20. I got away thinking I was with a sled and to the Heilbrunn hope that I had to return. Near the end in the last afternoon I found two places where the snow had avalanched off the ground & about 20 ft & in both cases there were ski tracks leading from the avalanche. It got to bed at 2.20 & was hot. The two is poor but the mattresses are excellent. It was a bitter cold night but there were plenty of blankets.

Nov 15. Off at 8.20. The South facing slope of the Schepel track Schepel track was frozen hard and the front of the sleds was held. It was too wet and had to slide slipping the base led I got to the top of the Schepel wall at 10.20 had food & left at 10.40. I turned sharp left & got to the bed at 11.20 - left at 11.40 & have got down. I wish I should have turned to the left bank of the stream when there is a dip in the valley floor, and place being very hard to get down. I got to the Heilbrunn track at 1.20 & had "tea warm" & food & left at 2.20. From after crossing the main ridge of the valley (the Heilbrunn track) I came to a big avalanche & then carried by sleds all time, as the going was hard

Shining 1833

Then I had them on. The path began to get very fine of sand & this I began to wonder when I was getting to. At last I came to a pool & then soon after I saw the stone path on the hillside which was clean & felt relieved. I took off my shoe about 100 yards before the Koserkrug inn - 6:30 when I had been & carried down the 1/2 mile to the station. I went to the Schenck Adler & then to the station & lived at first by baggage. I had the baggage on my way back to the hotel where I heard that the porter had got my baggage from the station a day or two before. I had an excellent hot bath & a change & then dinner. I talked to the baggage.

June 16. Visited shops packed & dinner with baggage

June 17 Caught the 8:15; had 1/2 hour in Dähl, dinner on the train, a very crossing.

June 18 Victoria 7:30 - she was arrived as they had evidently gone via Paris. Caught the 11:20 to Helsingør - & got in at 3:10.

- May 2 I left Harrogate on Tuesday May 2nd of the 11 o'clock train. In London I did a few things, & dined with the Alpine Club & went to lecture on Pausanias. I caught the 11 o'clock night train & as necessary
3. I had several things done in Paris & took 6.50 for various people
- Paris I in the end I stayed the night.
- 4 I left the Gare d'Orsay at 9.55; train not at all crowded very different to my journey up from Beauvais to Paris. After Beauvais I saw the beautiful country. After Paris I saw the lovely views. I got to Calais at 7 & went to a little inn. Hotel des Voyageurs.
- 5 I went out to see Calais & got some photos I wanted & had lunch at the Restaurant de la Comedie Francaise - where I got as good a lunch as before. I went back & changed to catch the train to Vers & stopped at the Train d'Or
- Vers
- 6 I got off at 8.15 leaving most of my things at the inn & walked up the valley of the Vers to the Ombrière Tolemie - the spring which the Romans led & was agreed to Calais & then climbed up to the old Gallic oppidum of Muros. The earthworks were in pretty good preservation - about 6 Kilom. round but I could not find any of the wells showing of which walk. I got back at 1.45 with a blister on my foot. After lunch I had a sleep. There is a church tower came on it. Swift pulled down. It first ceased off to the west & then the arch to Calais which I reached at 5.20. I set off at once & walked up to the Pech-Merle. The paintings were very good. I saw handprints - I had not seen before. also a footprint of a woman & child which had set their hand. The skulls of several can be seen & marks where the wall collapsed and been scraped of nails. I left at 7 & took the 8.10 train to Calais.
- Calais
- 7 I caught the 6.10 train & stopped at the Hotel Comptoir de Midi. I was noisy with the train. After lunch I went to the St. Severin Church for service. The singing was very beautiful but the

boys voices were very untrained. The tower 213 ft high is very fine. The lower arch with round head. Del. for XIII cent. the tower opens view for 1250. It is said to be the most perfect Romanesque building in France. The Gate Nizogville on the S. side of the nave has curious remains and a font. The church is practically unaltered since 1271. The double aisled western is exceptionally wide (106 ft) for so early a church. The choir seats (1670) are good & curious Bedfordian choir with behind the High Altar in the Ambulatory long XII cent. work in the Byzantine style. I then went to the Musée St. Raymond. Some fine XV cent. iron work. The most interesting thing was part of a bronze chandelier from Fa (Ande) & Gaulish collar & bracelets of gold. I went back for lunch & had a sleep & then out again. It came on to rain hard & having no manuscript I was kept drinking coffee in restaurants. I had dinner and walked back through the fair to the station.

May 8 up in good time & at the age of I went first to the Cathedral at the end and the buttresses between the windows have been strengthened in some cases blocking the light of the windows. But it is most peculiar the west end has a tower on the N. side & the roof is simply leaded to. The choir is cut on the same axis as the nave. Inside the most interesting thing is the Capetian's tomb dated from 1533. I went back to my hotel an indication of I am from Agence Heura & walked & had lunch the hotel to catch the 11.20 & find that my watch had stopped & was 1 o'clock! I waited till 4 & caught a fast train to Carcassonne.

In the same compartment we also heard of a girls school except Carcassonne they seemed rather old. They had come from Carcassonne for the day. The Pyrenees are 50 miles away 5000 ft up well - the highest I know of.

May 9 I went to the Vermin at Carcassonne. Campbell's was there. In the morning after visiting the Synical & visitation & still being unable to get an indication for I am. I went to the clo. most remarkable I walked round the St. Nazaire very beautiful & graceful. The nave plain Romanesque of 1095 & the choir had Gothic of 1300. The rose window of the S. transept is curiously fitted with a pointed arch opening. The double piers of the transept aisles have open tracery at the top. A curious carved stone of the Siege of 1213 may be hitting every one else. I went to a little restaurant, "Le Parnasse" about 50 yards from the St. Nazaire.

Had a very good lunch & after a nap went out to see the Chateau for 100 years it had been a barracks but has been cleaned up. Some good galls. Roman mosaics discovered on the level & Roman foundations. I then went toward the wells - the river well & got a parcel of photographs (5 p). I then drove to the Post Office after a cup of tea & looked the fine mosaic in the town hall. I missed the hotel which I intended (10) & went to bed.

May 10. Up in good time, packed, went up to the city again. Picking up my guide book which I had left in a shop. I wandered round the river between the two lines of fortifications, & took me a two photographs. Had lunch in the same place came back Albi & caught a train at 2.10 - to Castelnau & 40 min. with then to Carles 1 hour with to the Albi. Stayed at Terminus.

May 11. Went out to see the Cathedral of red brick standing up such close I went up to the main passage the statue of the Virgin & a statue of Albi & then left the Cathedral. The light was very pale. I got me a two photos & then went into the Cathedral. It is a magnificent place especially the 5th choir. I took three photos inside. Then toward the Chapel & the choir & after walking round the base of the west end I got photos from the railway bridge, after lunch went back & crossed the bridge & saw the museum (from) back & saw the train to Rodz.

Rodz I saw a station Rodz & saw a man for the train waiting so I got out & left by bag & took my luggage up me. I stopped at the Binay.

May 12. Chilled very cold, my book one blizzard in the town. Heard news at the Cathedral & walked round interesting especially two stone coffins of 14 & 14th cent. back for lunch & down for 1.10 for Seviac I was taken to the bank - Rodz is a good 2 Kilometre from the station & the main station, & I crossed by bag & went there. Married my train but the chef de gare had it sent up from Rodz Portables of a train carrying this. Repacked all my baggage & changed & started. & caught the 4 o'clock train - a slow M.V. on the Seviac. (Habit de dames)

Millan Left Clotier 14 worked but dinner & went on to Millan & got there 10.20 went to Hotel Terminus

May 13. Left at 5:15 & off to 6 o'clock bus, after leguense on begins to get better but the hills do not begin to close in till the Pyrenees which is on the left bank of the river. After the Viguer the bridge de Dames Al. Nucleus was stopped for lunch 8-8.30. I was glad to get some lunch - St. Prunier then on to St. Prunier, where I got off the bus. There was a lot of flowers. After walking round the ^{St. Prunier} little village, I set off back back & walked & early then the right bank joining St. Prunier & then which is on the left bank, the plain cliffs of Puygarron, & I stopped for lunch at the Chateau de la Page are old Chateau of XV cent. was a comfortable hotel. After a sleep I walked on to Nucleus about 11.11. in all - about 4.30 I went into the church an long country of about 11 cent. The aisle was 6 ft. wide - the pillars 4 ft 6. the nave was 8 ft. After changing I started about my feet being rather sore.

May 14. Went to Mass at 7.15 - a very nice - some birds. The birds about placed in the altar place in church the 5th - for the Virgin & the Virgin which he read. I got off & walked down. The limestone rock are of a red where there was red weather & clay. A ruined Chateau on the left bank. Just before the gorge I saw a broad - red cliff & a little cottage & across the river about 200 m. after it. I had a coffee & caught a bus at 5 o'clock up to Mayreuil up the very fine valley of the Jume.

Mayreuil I stopped at the Hotel de France. After dinner there was a procession with a band & Chinese lanterns & a few fireworks being the festival of St. John of the

May 15. I walked up to the castle of which practically nothing remains this I think has been cleared up & is now a ruin. The view of the strategic site was fine from the old post. Left at 8-10 & walked down. It was a fine walk at first cloudy & misty then the sun came out. I had some biscuits & a packet of jam & an biscuit & then went to sleep & got some ^{beer} at the end. I got down to La Roche 3.25. In the way down I saw a very fine green lizard quite 15 inches long crossing the road & a curious plant which has been like a small pump & stands up & which from what I saw 2 ft. high. I went up to Poyreleau on the left bank of the Joubé & took some photos, then down to La Roche & had a tea complete at hotel de voyageurs. I got the bus down at 6. I got off at Agence & captured two. So near for me as a matter of fact I walked 1 hr 10 min before it arrived. Then ~~was~~ is a big rise to the Chateau then the descent to Sévère le Chateau & down to Sévère Gare. I had dinner - it was 8 when I got in & "sat bed"

May 16. Did not get down for breakfast till 9.15. Walked up to S. le Chateau. Return fine but better from distance, back for lunch & sleep with diary & went out to take a photo of the Chateau via St. Jean St. Jean & down bed

May 17 Caught the 6.40 to Bertholles when I had to wait an hour for a train to Bagnols. All along the line the fields were clear with wild Narcissus. I got to Bagnols station at 10.6 & walked to Bagnols. It is quite small with the old village on a high rocky peninsula fringed by the Dordogne. I walked back to the main road & had lunch at the Café de la Gare at Roches - quite a good lunch - & then I left at 1.30. It was very hot but fortunately there was a breeze when the new road made a big sweep to the left. I followed the telephone poles & the old road straight on. When it became very rough on the top of the hill cut down as soon as possible bearing to the left as there are cliffs to the right. As a matter of fact I wanted some time then the new road makes a sweep to the left & at a little ways

take the old road (on the right) where below the Chateau the road is a road of 20' angle - which makes a sweep to the left. I was left for 50 yards & down a cart-track to the main road. I got to Espalins at 4. The old bridge XIII cent. of red sandstone is one of the most beautiful I have seen, especially with the reflection in the water. I stayed at the hotel Indesme complete. I walked up to St. Martin a village de Verses about 1/2 km. away. St. XII cent. very simple & a very good example of the last period. I got some photos with the train & left at 1.25 & walked down to Entrevaux. A fine good walk with bread & cheese in it. I had a cup of coffee & had a change of feet & had lunch at 4.40 17. Km. I stopped at the Hotel d'Or - & had good & reasonable.

May 19. I got off at 7.35 - after weighing 86 Kgs. I had to walk up the valley for 1/2 mile to the bridge. Just before the bridge on the other side of the river is a good view of the river & a few houses & a fine picture. I stopped at Veilleux at 11 for some coffee. A well preserved Chateau which it was impossible to photograph for trees. I had expected to find an inn at Paul de Cuvigny from the guidebook - there was none. I was cooking an auto project - 2 K. back. - So I crossed the bridge & walked on to Grand Val de where I had lunch at 1. 21 Km. I had lunch at 1.30 & left at 3.30 & got to Cuvigny at 4.45.

June 1 a fine morning - a good view in the suburbs. - D. only day - had out at 5.15. Caught the 11.20 to Harrogate at 3.15.

Austria 1933 (Summer)

July 7 After tea usual rest I got a taxi for the Pullman at 11.20 & found that the train was at 11! I wanted till the 12.50. I had some very little time in London. I went to the Club till the 11 o'clock train. It was very hot.

July 8 I had registered my baggage to Bâle and, so I got it out. I took it in the train with me to Zürich. I had dinner in the little restaurant under the station & got the 11.15 & went then to Landeck

July 9 Since I reached at 3.41 am & took a 2nd class train in 1st class I left at 4.21 getting there at 5.10. I worked up to hotel & went to sleep in the garage until I got some breakfast at 7. I got an auto at 8.35 up to Zwieselstein in time for lunch. I got word from Gottfried Schöpfer - Marly's uncle's guide - & arranged for him to come up to Gargol on July 12. It came on train. I stopped at the Post

July 10 A fine morning, I had breakfast at 7.30 & got off at 8.30 & walked up to Gargol having lunch on the way & stopped at the Edelweiss

July 11 I got unpacked & saw the President Dr. Döcker who is President of the Swiss Olympic Society & asked him to get me a badge. A big club of people in the hotel. Hitler had paid a 1000 mark fee in holiday making leaving Germany & Austria was suffering badly.

July 11 A wet morning, I got off at 8.30 & walked along the track to the Ranshofen & turned up steep, grass slopes to my right & got to the snow - had lunch & returned. I had been near the bridge on the stream, but a thunderstorm came on & I fled to a rock & watched the hill with me - good. Storm is did not last long & I got back & made tea. I got back in by both & unpacked

July 12 A very dark morning. Gottfried telephoned from Zwieselstein but I told him to come up. Got off at 10.40 & got to the Ranshofen at 2.20. It is high due to the glacier for any thing except

the Schafkogel & the Ranshofen. It cost 500 ft. then a wire rope for passengers is allowed. It came on to taxi & snow, 4 others in the Hut.

July 13 A bad morning & I went back to bed. It improved about 7 & I got off at 7.50 & went to the Ranshofen, as there was too much snow on the Schafkogel. I got to the Ranshofen at 7.55 & I drank one & a half & walked up the Schafkogel at 8. left at 9.10.

I had food at the Ranshofen 8.25 - 8.50 & then set off down to Vail & with a half of 10 min got there at 12. I went to the Post & had lunch & went to sleep in the room. I had some tea & got off at 3.50 & walked up to the Presens head which we reached at 6.28. It is a steep pull up.

July 14 We got off at 3.30 & went up to the Kletterhaus foot. The last part being pretty steep. I had a snow & then we went up the Wildspitze 6.45-7 & came back

to our sacks while we had life on the snow. 7.15-7.30 In setting in snow I broke my cap. I had it crack under me. We then walked on excellent snow to the Blockhugel & descended in to the Vernagel G. & trudged down on snow the way getting off to the meadow & the Vernagel head. 10.5 I got a shirt washed & went to bed

July 15 A bad morning we did not go out. We had intended to go on the Throckhugel & the Banckenberg head. A number of Austrian students for Innsbruck came up & were a very cheap crowd singing & playing games. A party of German say "Deutschland über alles" I refused to stand but it passed off quite well.

July 16 A dull morning we walked down to the Strickjock Hohe which also except for the Vernagel head the Strickjock. Starts about 500 ft above the stream & means this descent is ascent of a cloud. It rained & snowed. A very pleasant party of 4 Hollander father & 2 daughters who were going next day to the G. petroschauer. [I have seen a spirit at the Vernagel but also said there is a cupboard in the room opening with an ellie behind it]

Austria 1933 (S. Krumm)

July 17. up at 3, driving hoback for the Weiskugel, we got off at 6 in 10 miles of new snow & walked under the Harnisch joch & the Similauk head, where the top of the Finkelspitze was in snow wind & clouds so we did not go up it. After lunch we went up to sleep on the rocks, I darned a stocking. went to bed at 9.

July 18 we got off at 5:30 & got to the top of the Similauk at 7:50 on a glorious day, we left at 7:30 & went down on the G. Laf. glacier & across to the Margell joch & got to the top of the Strikere Schwaige at 8:30 had food, I had a Margell glacier. The snow was good till we got down on the lower part - we got off on the main on the left bank first above the last snow fall 11:25 - 11:45. I saw a Chamois on the Margellwand & then we went round the foot of a M. W. to S. Krumm on head 12:5. Food. Saw many Stalactites on the Similauk joch buying many packets of cigarettes. went to sleep.

July 19 up at 3 & off at 4:15, staying at 1000m below head. Crossed the end of the Margell glacier & up the Schalf glacier, when we got to the wide open head we turned left up rocks to the D. Wein Schank & got to the top of the Schalfkogel at 10:5. we had some food & left at 8:30. & went down the Schalfkogel joch to the Fideleia head: 9:50 - 10:20 down to the new Kalks in the 11:30 food left 12:30 & walked down to Gurgel. Had a bath paid off Gottfried's last letters etc. Got D.O.A.V. badge arranged to meet Gottfried on 25th at B. had for Weiskugel if he had no long engagement. went to town at 7. D. Angely said man - his bracelet - very simple ritual. Majority of women & girls with no hat or handkerchief, most of them took the Sacrament. Rearranged baggage. Found my bag was an 20 Kiloge & had to get the post to send it down.

July 20. off 5:45 & walked down to Zwieselstein 7:45. There was no wind to speak for sun time so I arranged for my bag to be sent on to Landeck & walked keeping to the R. bank (blue marks) & following river above Platten crossed a bridge which had at the top of the slope in the fir trees between wind of hütte & the Chelbi alpe S. A guide came up to tell me that Gottfried had a long engagement, then I could give him, with some light paper & that he would take his place for the Weiskugel. I signed my name at the B. B. house in town. night.

July 22 the morning looked better, I got up at 3 & off at 4, up to the Pfaffen joch & across to the Pfaffen saddle & up the head last ridge to the top of the Zucken head. 6:45.

I had food on the top. The wind was nothing, the D. Wein Schank was very black & lowering in front of a yellowish red sky. I left at 7:20 had 5 min at the joch & was back at the head at 9. The snow was good except for the last bit.

I had a snack & laid down at 8:35. On the descent instead of following the new track I had come up by, I went down the old trail which keeps to the G. air bed that. This is much easier for the descent. I had a bath for a drink of tea from the Schmoos & got down to Földen at 12:35. I had an amulet & some wine & left at 1:35 and back to Zwieselstein. Had a shower & a change of my second bag & food to Landeck.

July 23. A bright morning. I went to town at 6, again the cabinet had been written & most of the women & girls better. The gospel was in German. The ritual was very simple, the sermon was rather political. I had lunch at the Post & left at 12:45 & walked up to the V. end in a S. Colli head - was having shells as it came on down. I got to at 4:15 & stopped at the Post. changed & had tea - still dripping.

July 24. looked at 8:30 looked very good, I left at 7:15. Was just starting to go down to the capone when a blizzard came, I got off at 8:30 & set off for the V. end at 10:30 - 11 just below Platten. I got to the bridge below the head at 12:15 & was at the head 12:35. I had food & sleep. I heard an Schiffl & Johannes had gone off to the Wildspitze. I was asked to go to the head but they had not arrived & I set off at 3:30 leaving word for the guide to follow. I was very & got to the D. Wein Schank at 5:15 & the B. B. head at 6. & the head was enveloped in clouds. The guide turned up later on.

Zuckenhead

July 25. I woke at 2, but I was not called & at 2:45 I slipped out & went up the guide & the cook, he got off at 3:40. The snow was excellent & we got along well. We got to the top of the Vernagelwand Stig at 4:40 & with a short halt got to the bottom at 5. We got to the Weiskugel just at 6 and got rest off again at 6:20. The guide was upset & was repeatedly sick. It was rather heavy work for him as the old steps were I crawled up. We were on the top at 7:40. A party arrived from Hiltl's hut & 3 or 4 parties were joining us. It was a glorious day. We left at 8:15 & found the snow very good to descend. We were back below the Weiskugel just at 8:45 & the top of the Vernagelwand Stig at 9:45. We left at 10:15. Left the snow had been very good, but it began to get soft & we got to the hut at 12 hrs & tired. I had food & went to sleep in the locker putting my pillow in my knapsack to sit on. I paid the guide & sent him down. I found Schütz & a ^{H.B.} ~~man~~ Johnson of Guildford & a man J.T. Crowder with whom we had a long talk in the evening. They had had a very heavy day on the Weiskugel & had just come on Sunday that day, & were going on the Weiskugel to the Schöner Aussicht Hut tomorrow.

July 26 I left at 6 & went down the G. epalsch Haus - Ruedelapp hut - 7 - near the track down again 7:35 - (left 7:55). I stopped for tea & food 8-8:30 G. epalsch Haus. 10. - I saw a note of a new hut - Seeli Hut - at the Ochsenalp, but it is very jagged. After food I decided to go down, but eventually picked up a couple of engaged & guide for the G. lock team. I went out & worked my 5 lockings had a sleep & engaged a guide.


July 27 got off 3:45, returned on steps curved ledge & went up & sleep near path then left at 4:30 we were on a new level alp, opposite the junction of the Krummgaubel track & the Riff track 4:50. Followed a good path with way marks. Opposite the Stein covered summit of the Riff tower we halted 5:45 - 5:55 for a snack & a little before we got to the snow 6:15 - 40 for food. The snow was a good rule that was on the top at 5:13.

G. lock team

It was a plain day & I was able to get - with my hand the geography of the upper mountain with the passes from Landeck to the Skitov - means & Switzerland. The Mutter of the Samsonium that was just opposite. We left at 8:40 & had a meal of Austrian chocolate from the Hohenstein Haus. Had the top off 9:5 (-9:10). Halted on the flat - above the junction of the K. & R. streams & had food & rest 10-10:30. The guide had some cows on the alp, they came up when he called them & he looked them over. In stead of going down the way we came up he went over a little and picked the new road with long zigzags so obvious from the other side of the valley into the G. epalsch Haus when it was back to the road to the stream at the head of the G. eye of the G. epalsch Haus & got a bridge & a path up. We were back at 11:45. I had tea & Kieche went out. Sleep & dried my clothes had lunch 1:30 paid the guide (Ruedelapp) & went down to the bridge for the 4:30 auto, booking a seat before it started. At Fiecht we had a penance, on the way down we had all before us - while the snow & crevasses between G. epalsch Haus & the Hagenau & at Prutz he had to change to a pony. I went to the Hotel P. at Landeck & put my baggage & took a pair of boots to be resoled. He had no lice.

July 28 packed my baggage - with letters got my boots & had lunch & caught a 5:30 train to Innsbruck (it took 2 hrs). I went to the Samson & took a room & then went to Wilting & got a train to the train in my notes. He was very kind for an hour & did not seem to know much about them. He then said he had been to far from the edge. I bought a few things & then a bunch of blue corn on & I had 6 shells as my mascot was in the tent. I bought some presents as a token.

July 29 I got a train to Hall at 8:30 & got there 9:5. The parish church is very curious. It has an aisle on the N. side with three pillars & a row of pillars in the center of the nave directly behind which is the high altar, a 5th of letters is built up from the S. side leaving only a narrow passage between it & next to the 5th of the central pillar, outside a curving porch. had lunch & packed. It came on to rain again & I gave up all
hope of the ^{S. was longer} S. ~~S. was longer~~ & the Scesoplane & caught the
5 o'clock train down. A post came in which had been left
at the hotel & reported 6 circles of head & neck.

July 31 A letter came from the hills in cloud. I caught the 10:45
to Feldkirch & was with the train & took some plants. I then
cleared the & packed up my things. I got to the road on
the Biber. at 11:59 I changed at Sargans & Schweigau
& got to Zurich at 3:30. I bought me a few things & went
out & sat by the lake reading till 5 when I came back
& had dinner, I went out to get wood & then to bed.

Aug 1 Had a bath, caught the 8:52 for Biele, registered my bag at
Lindau, was with the train, had lunch at the station & caught
the Lockock for Augsburg. A carriage to myself.

Aug 2 I stopped the night in Lindau to do some shopping, it was
appalling hot & I went home on Aug. 3.

Two nights of great heat, two nights at the Verajell. had & all the Prunobenz & the
other in the night.

Provence Nov. 1933.

Nov. 2. I left Harrogate at 11.0 train & got to London & registered my letters & got on a two hour train, went to the Club for dinner & caught the 11.15 train via Dunkirk

Nov. 3. A rough crossing, slept well till all the ash trays scattered off the table, then I bed. A wet morning - all crossings via Calcutta at Dunkirk. It was raining at Paris so took a taxi to Hachettes got the guide book & some notes & then bus to the Grand Lyon. I bought a beer table & coffee & got down to look at train. I had meant to catch the 12.32. I found I was just too late for the 11.40 so left this evening & got in time. I had lunch at the Charles Blatigny & got the 12.32. A carriage (by self & I sleep & good food) the ancient seats were very beautiful esp. at Ambletrem & near Dijon. I changed at Dijon to train to Chagny. I had an hour wait & got a very good dinner at the station. Then slow train 1/2 hour to Auxois & then to Verdun at 5.30. I went to the "Jermine", had a drink & went to bed

Nov. 4. A dull morning, started out at 5.30. I was first to the Syndicat d'Initiative & got a guide book. Then to the Musée which seemed impossible to photograph Schifanois. Then to the Musée which was quite good; on leaving I asked a man the way to the Paul St. André. He asked me if I was English & when I said yes he showed me in a regular form of praise for the English of which I got a card as well as a line of paper & was giving me a right answer. Then to the Paul St. André - a fine gate with two passages for cars & two for pedestrians. It was very old but I took a step. Then across the stream to the Temple of James a curious building standing out in a field 20 ft high & sides are ft. high. Two sides remain. I went back to the Hotel & had a good lunch & set out again taking my bag up to the Champ de Mars where an Aunt & Uncle for Chagny & Chalon. I left the bag & went off & found the "Romain" said to be one of the most complete. The seating shows well, but nothing else. The "Boulette of the Grand Soud" of the Rugby football ground which is just the front of the theatre has many statues & had all the best bits. Then to the Cathedral. 
Some of the Roman remains had been copied. Then I went into the Musée Rolin where there was a good collection of prehistoric & Roman remains. I took the bus at 4 & found it to be a bit of a haul but the train I could not catch as earlier than a Chalon and hence. So I got to Chagny had some coffee & then walked to the station & after an hour wait had dinner & caught the 20.9 to Lyons. At Lyons the train waited for 1/4 hour. (22.30 to 23.44) I got up & got my bag which I had registered through Lyons & got it in the carriage with. Vienna is a fine town & I got off ready to go. Then to the Paul St. André where part of the "Via Aurelia" has been exposed very high & very rough but the rest still shows in stone. Then to St. Pierre was the "Lepidary Museum". Two centuries of Roman art. Then to the Cathedral which was much better than of the Protestants under the Baron d'Adels. I was in for hours. I really had hope for some of the big bit Cathedral. I had a very good lunch for 12 fr. near the Cathedral, went back & took my bag to the station. I had taken my bag bag & registered it to orange colour in. It had begun to rain about 2.30. I had been very good of my coat for the cold at Auxois & was I was glad of it for the rain. I got to Vienna at 2.23 & went to the Jermine the museum hotel. It had been very dull & cloudy with occasional light rain & I had needed my exposure.


Nov. 6. I caught 1.7. saw arch to Grand Serro, thinking that the
 "Caude Bleri" made it not a very good example of a fortified village

 Merovingian. VIIth century. I was inside them are no longer to be seen

I then continued by walk round ramparts to come back of the Porti Lagaine & looked at the outside of S. Symphonin & S. Pierre to the Hotel. The afternoon was fine but windy.

Nov. 10. I got up in good time & went to Mass at 8. It was cloudy at first but the sun came out soon. I was on the Papei Palace - a magnificent fortress. One of the reasons of its being built was fear of the big hill "the Companies" who were making themselves a nuisance in France. After lunch I walked to Villeneuve & got an a few photos & got back about 4:30. I had letters & lunch of my day & went to bed.

Nov. 11. I went to S. Agnes, but there was no Mass at 8. A Mass on the 10 says men at 6:7 is said but only the 6 o'clock is certain, a bell will

be rung at 7:45 to the hour of Mass. I had not heard the bell so I was rather doubtful. I went at about 8:30 to get a photo from the Roches du Don but it was a bad light. Early in the morning there would be good view. I watched the ceremony at the "Mouvement aux Morts" a Procession from the Place de l'Heritage & then placing wreaths. I got another photo from the Rue Peyrolerie. I ~~also~~ watched a funeral being by auto-car with the Place - came back & rearranged my luggage. After lunch I went to the Museum but found it was closed all day for "reparations" I walked round the feet of the ramparts I had left on; came back had a cup of tea - & still the rest of the walk in the woods & at the table, but did not do any real damage. I did not get up till 11, & had an excellent & sum breakfast for dinner. Although I had some chlorodyne with me. In the afternoon I went to the Musée Colbert. The collection of medals was very good. There the Musée Lapidaire where I saw the "Déesse au Maillet" but was unable to obtain a picture of it. Somewhere they were standing of clouds of small balloons. I felt fairly well in the evening.

Nov. 13. I got to Mass at 8 & caught the 10 o'clock auto to Remoulins. I had a cup of coffee & then crossed the Suspension bridge & walked to the R bank of the river. The suspension walk had been Paul de Gaulle only comes into view at the last moment. By the light of the road when all heavy traffic is directed to take to avoid the Suspension bridge it will be visible for some time. But that is not the case to take photo as the new auto bridge shows & it is in the sun. Just after the hotel (on R. bank) I followed a path up which took me to the other side of the bridge & well up. I took a photo & then followed the path down to the river. The best view is upstream from a rocky bar. I returned to where I had left my sack & sat a "poit pain", admiring the colour & shape of the Point de la 369 m long + 47 x 77 high. & bridge water from the Eure near by over the Gap on the river. Nov. 14. Was to the Reine Caracac when it was on a train so I had to the Musee de Epideemie. The most curious statue is a fine Roman figure statue of the god G. It stopped & led to I got back to the hotel & had lunch & as it rained I set off with my cap & camera, & went first to the Fontaine park of which go back to Roman times. Then to the Temple of Diana, then up to the Musee Nazario. This was the remains of the 50 tiers which originally existed. A Gallie tower of ~~the~~ were made & then encircled the castle. The tower of I believe tower it was a strong hold, but it was pulled down under Henry IV in belief treasure was concealed in it. It is 30 m. high. It was the cloudy but with a day like the top of the trees. I got 2 photos of the Reine Caracac built in the year 1 A.D. in honor of Caesar & Julius Caesar the adopted son of Augustus. It is considered the most beautiful of the R. remains in Gaul. It is built in a cell called the Reine Capoduel - a corruption of Capitolium. It is 25 m 13 m x 12-29




20-5 m 5 m 15 steps Inside a good collection of statues etc. & a very fine collection of Gallie & Roman coins. Then to the Cathedral, St. G. de N. One of the altars is the part of a 14th cent. Sarcophagus showing O.B. & the XII apostles. I then to the Reine Caracac. The access is by an arch 13 m 25 x 10 m 40: width & 33 m 59 high. The open amphitheatre - under a half-wing but blank wall - a Roman ground. I stayed on some time & as it rained returned to the hotel & headed my coat.

Nov. 15. I got up at 6.30 & had breakfast & I looked out the St. G. de N. but did not see of the St. G. de N. till 11. I spent a little at 9.17 & went off to the Reine Caracac getting there at 10.25. In some way it is very remarkable the Caracac. The tower construction is very fine & well built. The staircase is finished & opening in the wall at the top has a door which I tried to open & I dropped a tin of the small window & nicotol on the attack. This tower stands off the wall & was built ^{Paris} of stone & a part when starting in the Crusade. His son Philip & Henri completed the fortification in 1272 - It is said the walls followed the plan of Damietta. The tower construction is 37.20 m. high & the wall are 6 m. thick to the first floor. I found by Elvira's light that I had not seen the statue.

 I got to the church after breakfast. I got then a clear picture of the
 Church. It is a simple Gothic spire against Salomon & Pierre
 I had been with a Restoration of stone - of wood & copper to
 12.37 train I was able to see a good deal of the fact I had been in
 in the dark. I had intended to get off at Albans &
 walk to St Giles but the weather was still raining &
 I refused so I went on to Arles Nequele. I walked
 across the Hotel Meidi. Got to town & went to the station for
 my bag & returned & went to the Syndicat & I walked. As so often
 the only interest was in the fixed auto hours. I had come
 to the hotel had tea & arranged my baggage - sent things to the
 Wash. - wrote up diary. Just as I was going down to the cinema
 all the electric light went out. They kept coming up for a moment
 & then going out. There was a heavy thunderstorm as it
 expected - they had trouble. I went to bed & fell asleep at 8.30.

Nov 17. I got up & caught the 7.45 to St Giles. It was rather a dull
 morning but the maid assured me it would not rain. I got to St Giles at
 8.15. Many of the vineyards were under water, three days ago
 I had seen a man being mowed. I had seen he had got it all in. I had
 a walk round them went to Cafe & had a cup of coffee & wrote

a letter home saying that I would cut short my trip & to home for my birthday.
 I then wrote & photographed the west porch of the church. It is very fine
 I took one close up of center but got a bit out of focus being under 32 ft.
 I then went into the church for a bit & returned to the town & had some coffee
 & bread. While there it began to fall with rain & I was tired
 I saw. At Arles it was a bit so bad but after I got in the
 thunderstorm was really at its worst. I got back at 1.40 & stayed in
 Nov. 18. Went to the bank & then to find out the station for Paderne des Baux
 I found it easy to find branches off just after the Paderne station on the
 way to the P. L. M. Road. I found that it is not too far from
 Paderne des Baux station but an auto starting from the
 Boulevard near the Paderne des Baux. I then walked round
 the remaining part of the wall to the Alyce camp. A collection
 of Chambers Glyses. I have a fine collection of stone of fine
 pagans & X trees. The first wall left has the 4 corners
 raised  the 2nd has a raised piece in the center as
 well to 6  the 3rd is plain  & the 4th flat.
 The Chapel of St. Anne is interesting - I saw a variety of G. G. G.
 The chapel has been flooded with the recent rains & is capped

 then walked down the market on the boulevard seeking the

 I had a good & very pleasant lunch at a little restaurant
 "Au Petit Café" in the Avenue Victor Hugo. Then to St. Stephen
 & the very beautiful chateau. As there was no time, by waiting
 I took another photo of the W. Wall. Then to Musée Raoul
 from & the Roman bath. The system of heating & the well

I left at 1 & got 5:15 Rain at

S. Remy. 2.55. I had coffee & found that the last train was an anti at 4. I set off to find "Le Carrière" & found it is 1. K. too out of the line I decided to go so I set off. The anti & the granolans are very fine

I found some time taking photos between the train. I then went to S. Paul which is close & saw the prehistoric hills & the delightful clousters. I got back at 4.20 & found that there was an anti at 4.30 to Arignon so I decided to go there & to go to I am sure of the mountains. I got in about 5.30 & went to the house works changed in my head by day.

Nov. 20. I caught the 5.15 to Arignon & was there soon after 5.35. I went with the train & with the Cathedral. It is quite small but rather nice. a good many pictures are - curious enough - being left here on the anti & labels. I went with the train - & stopped at what is called Arignon, so I was unable to see the part. There is an altar in S. Paul. I then went to the clouster, for some years it had been a prison but now it is a M.H. & visitors can go in it. In winter it is 9 x 10 x 3. In summer nearly every hour, but it is crowded with people at fixed times in the hour. It is well worth seeing. I then went to Beaucarnon. S. Paul des Ardennes has a cobbler holding the child Jesus with a King in case of the W. part. I then went to the market place, I got a couple of petit-pierres & I was getting very hungry & up to the castle. The triangular "Dunoy" tower is curious. The top of the angles are "eased off." It then began to rain. I went along the road viewing inland from the entrance & took the first turn the R up a cobbled alley & got on to the work facing the castle & got a couple of photos as it was raining. I then went to Arignon. The Reims was in fair flood & several houses were under water. I was glad to get along as I had a bit of the fortification was clear the water. The "reps" at the station & the 2 o'clock train back to Arignon packed - the anti.

 D. O'Brien just opposite the station. Had a meal round
 me & stepped on public seal. I walked about the town &

July 15 up Bay & carry to 9.45 to Zell... 11.30... 12.30. I believed in various cages & birds... 12.30.

July 16. a dull morning. Gottfried Schöpf arrived on Monday having come from Sölden in the day. Rain came on again. packed & had tea at...

July 17. a better morning, got my bag off of post to Innsbruck & caught the 8 o'clock train up to Hesselbach in the Kapfen... 9.10 & went up... 10.20-10.35... 11.55.

with poor & dear. Then asleep - I was too tired to sleep... 5.55. 2802. I with her...

July 18 he got off at 5 & arrived at 5.40... 6.40. had a walk... 7.40. I was cold & windy... 8.30. he started off 8.45... 10.15 we were at the top of... 11.30. I was very tired, but revived after food...

Descending the fog lifted & we found that we were going down into the Kapfen... 3.28. & then walked across to the Oberwalde... 3.50. Had tea & wine & slept. The bed fairly full.

July 19. After a talk with Gottfried in the early morning, he finally got off at 7.40 & walked down to the Hofmann... 9.45-10.15. Don't see the... 11.40-11.50... 12.30. The first thing we saw was the... 1. in 1000... 10.35... 11.55.

July 20. We got off at 5:30. Goldfinger had borrowed a pair of crampons for me, but they did not fit & the left one finally came right round my foot facing the other foot. The climbing was not difficult, this is all I could say. We were at the top at 7. There was practically no view as we were in fog all the time. We left at 7:25 & were at the hut at 8. We packed & had a plate of soup & set off at 9:30 & going directly across the slide but at 10:40 we had a heel - very well cooked. The woman was very doubtful of my photo in the D.O.A.V. museum and Goldfinger had to call in to identify me. We got off at 12:15 & on a very steep path keeping to the left bank all the time (I believe it might be worth crossing the bridge at the 1800 m level) & got down into the Kalsen chert at 2:15. We went round the corner & had a hell-leaving at 2:30. We had the remains of an tea just beyond Ramesau. 3:45 - 4:50 got to the ^{KALSER} Kalsen Jannenhause 1950 at 4:20. & had some tea & got a shoe-hoof. At the Städt hut they told us that a track will be made on the Frieschberg-schank to the Kalsen Jannenhause.

G. Goldfinger

July 21. Could not sleep, we got off at 5:20 & crossing the bridge went straight up a new red marked path which is shown on the 1:100,000 map. We found the track had been forgotten, so we had to climb. Chocobals 7:20 - 7:45. The weather looked remarkable threatening. However when we came to the first chert mark the fog to set off N.E. & climbed to Kl. Muntlach 10:20 leaving our sacks at the foot. There was a rocky walk down with a wire rope & rocky walk up & the weather looked so bad & we were both pretty hungry. We left at 10:35 & kept close under the rocks of the S.S.W. ridge which is the continuation of the Muntlach. To get better views we climbed up an Sack which had 5 min rest & were at the Puchstein Dentel Mt. 11:30. The direct descent from the Muntlach to Landeck Säge is very bad & rough. A big crowd there. We left at 2:5 & at the ^{MATREI} Aussen Steinig Alp sawy right, leaving the road to the left. Pleasantly it began to get damp & from 4:5 - 4:30

We sheltered in a cave. - Which Goldfinger & I liked. The calves & "Schwein haus". It rained with rain & then cleared. The 2nd track became very bad & we worked away in less places. At 1 I was very tired & it was raining pretty steadily. We had heard that - then would be Man of the Kalsen Jannenhause & were intending to spend an hour or so in security. But at the Landeck Säge they told us time was up - so later than thought we turned in. In a few days I had been bothered with a bit of my right arm about 2 inches below the ampio. & it had been pretty painful. So I think that it was it we were looking at.

July 22 left at 7:45 & got to the Kalsen Jannenhause at 9:15 & found my face was peeling, the 1 had had suspected it - the 1 & 2 showed & found the 1 - I had a beard of 6 (or 7) old skin. We treated the bit with hot foam which had nothing would be expected. The M.T. is very complete & very cheap & the people very willing.

July 23 a wonderful morning so we stayed in & I continued to work using the water & the Goldfinger returned. A very pleasant climb. I had some tea & bread for the "spotted". I watched them fishing for trout in the stream. They got 6 & had some in the stream. I had done myself well - including the 1 & the 2 for 2 old days was up 25 sel. & they worked my camp's feet.

July 24 we got off at 8. We passed Chapel down out of the work at G. Schloss. At Aussen of Schloss we had coffee. Two old German Brevetiers looking about. I do not know how one they got up there. 8:0 - 8:25 - got to the Allen Plaza hut at the head of the 12-12-45 & got to the Payer hut at 1. I did my own stream at 5 was. 2 parties of 2 came up & camped on the Venetian. I got a drink to work at my arm as it seemed full of cysts.

July 25 left at 4 was to bed & saw I was did not go outside. Heard that the 1 of a party of 3 had been climbing & climbing for the Allen Payer hut & had not returned. They had been down to the Baden & Defregger & a Kalsen.

July 26. Started all night about 12 miles of snow. Snow gradually disappeared after lunch. Gotfried & I went up to the top of the 2057. A party came up & told us of Dollfus excavations. A party of 20 Dettlebein came up.

July 27. Up at 3:45 dressed & down in an hour, went to bed as it was raining finally got off at 5:45. Put on the rope at 6:45. Fog & bitter wind & steel. could not see 10 yards ahead. An party went off to the Uvediga (8 of them returned) he found an way of camp. & the cot between the two Uvedigas & gave up all idea of trying to climb he had just had a glimpse of the Mt. Uve. & then we should turn down, he & Gotfried succeeded saw a faint ^{1/16} blue snow cap from the Keesig. he saw down to camp & except for the discomf- an timber was all. he had the top off at 10:45 & some food & leaving at 10:45 got to the Keesig & camp & campsite at 11:20. Had food & left.

July 28. With a tan up & looking morning decided to go down. he left at 6. Had food at a complete Alpen Verein campsite the 12:10 left seen see 14:15 got coffee left 14:32 got to St. Michael at 17:05. Gotfried went on train & I went to the scene

July 29. up camp & went to have arranged baggage wrote 11 letters went to Berg Hotel for lunch - cost 7.10. Miss Grege came back & took a photo of the Goldenen Dacht. had tea with up diary. weather still worsening & clouds obscuring the hills.

July 30. up early stopped packed baggage 14:0. had breakfast & left wife on the platform. we went in the "Anscheid-Wagen" he got me out up from Bettled. They got off at Langenfeld & I went in to Sölden where I met Gotfried. I stayed in his recommendation at "Gruener Alpenverein" completely clean & cheap he avoid a wood and facing the church & the stream. I had got some more "wound plasters" in Innsbruck & cleaned the first which had a lot of pus in it & put on a piece & fresh piece of lint. It healed them very quickly.

July 31. had breakfast 7:15. Gotfried sent word that he has been ill with his cold and in the night - had had the doctor who told him that he was a cold virus of the day. I left word that I would go up & take all the things & he and even when he was inclined I got off at 8:25 & walked up to Feigl's with him when I had coffee & rolls 10:25-11:5. In an hour I was at the division of the paths & there was a sharp at 12:15 with half way to the top. about 15 miles below the Seigerland but I saw Gotfried coming up a great pace so I waited for him & got to the top at 2:30. His brother is the Hutterer. Two people came on with a guide from the Hutterer.

Aug 1. A wet morning. he left at 8:45. I packed my coat & underwear my sack wearing the steel. he stopped at Feigl's 10:30-11:5. got down to Sölden at 12:10. The Hutterer and first guide on. he had been got down recently dry. I got my boots which D. & M. had made repaired.

Aug 2. Clay & tea 6:30 and left for Weiselsau at 6:50 & walked up in the shade almost to the top where I had coffee at Gruener Alpenverein a complete of the Sölden as. Dotted at the Mohrenhand (a complete of a Drei Moehrens of Obly) seen clean & fresh by camp. I left again at 8:40. & was at the Seigerland Obregay at 8:35. I found that Hutterer and myself were in the hotel with 3 guys by airbus. I met Wyberg who is at the other hotel & said he is in the Obly section. Gotfried came up & we arranged to climb the Grand Schige Hutterer.

Aug 3. I got up at 7:30 to an early morning with a South wind. I had breakfast & went to sleep again. arranged maps & had a water breakfast at 9. he walked on to the other hotel & had a very long one on the mountain of this section. with letters. called on Herr Dangler. had lunch & left. had tea. wet night.

Aug 4. rained hard all night. went to bed at 11. watched precipitation 1:30 in 2 feet down in minute 4 inches. walk with Hutterer & Peil & Stein had sleep. was the Hutterer had had himself chattered.

Aug 5th Went to bank at 8 - Roopy - Lammun serum mass. Walked to Guy Hotel. Lammun left. Linn and with Hengel.

Aug. 6. I had set my camera baggy & did not get off till 6.10. Was started off up the road the new cemetery with the Verwood and got to the glacier at 8.30 had a search of food & left at 8.45 & got to the Col. W. of the Grand Hotel at 10. The Schland was quite easy, we had 5 men. I left an sack on the col & started up the rock ridge with a series of teeth - small laboratory - got to the top at 11 in a 9 hour day. We had some food & left again at 11.25 & was on sack on the col at 12.5. I understood Goppinid & say we had better go down & wait as the new snow might cause the snow to fall down the gully so at 12.10 we started off climbing up a little & then bearing west & traversing a good deal of rather loose down sloping rocks & then down still bearing west I saw a little glen where we found a good deal of Colalwein & crossed the actual snow of the glacier & halted for lunch on the ^{old} Mercurius. We left at 2.15 & climbed up the plain slope E of the White Mount & descended some finding a good path which took us to the ski hut at 3.15 - where we had food & tea & rest & left at 4.50 got to the New Karlsbad hut at 6. When we stopped for the night. I found a fine bluish needles by the hut.

Aug 7

We got off at 4.15 & went up the Lamy trail & got to the glacier & put on the rope 6.30 - 6.45. We climbed round the high side of the glacier. They decided an excellent Dinner to be given by personal coming. I was on 10 of us. Aug 10 We got off at 8 & got to Fiegl's at 8.45 & had coffee & bread & left at 10.25 & got to the Long Scepterland hut at 1.25. I had lunch & dried my things in the sun. I was the only person in the tent.

Aug 11 up at 4.30 & off at 6.15. I stopped to take a couple of clouds ^{of the Stock wille} while the rope was put on. Got to 7.45 - 8. We got to the top at 8.45. A fine morning but. Mercurius to be a cloud about Stanklshut especially in the west. We left at 9 & walked down west down rocks & climb down & across to the Hohlhaus (Kittlerhaus) (in Rif. Chies Linn) between the Wilder Pfaff & the W. Fiegl's the P. Joffmann's - at 9.45 had some food & left at 10.15 & got to the Beecher house at 10.15. This used to be notably comfortable hut, but since the Italians have had it, it has become dirty & the food bad.
