

Any person conveying (otherwise than by the post) a letter not exempted from the exclusive privilege of the Postmaster-General, incurs, by law, a penalty of £20 for every letter so conveyed.

#### POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

Every Money Order Office is also a Post Office Savings Bank, and open for Bank Business during the same hours as for Money Orders.

Deposits of one shilling, or of any multiple of one shilling, may be made at any Post Office Savings Bank.

Interest is allowed to each Depositor at the rate of 4½ per cent. per annum on the balance at the credit of his account when it does not exceed £200, and at the rate of 4 per cent. when it exceeds £200; but no interest will be allowed on more than £500.

#### Electric Telegraph.

#### REGULATIONS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH TELEGRAMS ARE AUTHORISED TO BE TRANSMITTED BY THE TELEGRAPH BELONGING TO THE GENERAL GOVERNMENT OF NEW ZEALAND.

1. The Government is not responsible for errors, omissions, or delays in the transmission of telegrams, nor for the non-transmission of any telegram.
2. Printed forms, upon which telegrams should be written, may be obtained at all stations on application.
3. All telegrams presented for transmission must be written in ink, in a clear and legible manner; they shall contain a proper address, and bear a genuine signature in the usual handwriting of the sender.
4. In order to prevent errors in the transmission of telegrams, all words must be written in full, and no abbreviation will be allowed. It is advisable to write all numbers in words in full, and not in figures.



5. Telegrams will be transmitted in the following order of priority:—

- (1.) Telegrams of the General Government marked *urgent*.
- (2.) Telegrams relative to the arrest of criminals or persons accused, or the discovery or prevention of crime.
- (3.) Telegrams relating to cases of pressing emergency, such as accident, sickness, or death, may be transmitted in priority to any others.

6. Telegrams may be written in cypher, which will be counted according to the following scale, whether for figures or letters:—Separate cyphers count as one word; groups of five cyphers, or fractional part of five cyphers, count as one word; groups exceeding five cyphers are counted at the rate of five cyphers to the word, and any fractional portion remaining is to be counted as one word.

7. Telegrams will be delivered free of charge within one mile of the station to which they may be transmitted by wire.

8. Should the sender of a telegram desire to have the telegram repeated, to insure accuracy, such repetition will be made at a charge of half the rate of the original telegram.

9. Telegrams may be taken from the sender with the word "Collect" written thereon, and in such case the payment for the telegram will be collected from the receiver of the telegram; but in the event of the receiver refusing to pay, the sender of the telegram shall be held responsible for the due payment thereof.

10. Telegrams may be taken from the sender of a telegram with the words "Reply paid" written thereon, and in such case the payment for the telegram in reply will be collected from the sender of the first telegram.

#### URGENT TELEGRAMS.

Telegrams marked *Urgent* will be received at any Telegraph Station and transmitted as *Urgent Messages* in the order of their priority with other messages of the like code.

Urgent telegrams will take precedence of all ordinary messages.

The fee for an urgent telegram is double that charged for an ordinary telegram.

#### DELAYED TELEGRAMS.

Delayed telegrams are now received at any Telegraph Station throughout the Colony for transmission, final delivery to the address given being effected by post.

The rates chargeable on all such messages are as follows, viz.: Sixpence (6d) for the first 10 words (exclusive of address and signature up to 10 words), and a halfpenny (½d) for every additional word. Fractions of a penny in computing charges are not allowed. Senders of delayed telegrams are requested to give as full address as possible, and are also requested to write, in "Instructions" on the message, the word "Delayed."

In addition to the rates above mentioned, postage is charged as follows:—If the delivery is within the postal district of any town, one penny (1d); outside the postal district, twopence (2d). In dealing with these telegrams, the department undertakes to telegraph them to their destination on the day of their receipt, and to post them the same evening.

#### STAMPED TELEGRAMS.

In order to encourage the use of the Telegraph, and as a matter of convenience to the public, telegrams will be received for transmission at any Telegraph Office throughout the Colony, if sufficiently stamped with the ordinary postage stamps in lieu of payment by coin.

The stamps are to be affixed on the top right-hand corner, immediately under the heading "Fees received."

Telegraph forms and envelopes, having the words (printed in red) "Telegram for transmission to the Officer in charge Telegraph Station," can be procured at all Post Offices throughout the Colony.

Papers publishing before 5 p.m. each day, in addition to Australian or San Francisco Mail telegrams, will be allowed to receive at any period of the day telegrams amounting in the aggregate to 200 words, and will be charged for the same at Evening rates; any excess over the 200 words to be paid for at the rates in force between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

On Sundays, double the above rates.

No charge will be made for address and signature up to 10 words; every word over 10 will be charged for at Tariff rates.

#### WEATHER TELEGRAMS FOR SHIPPING.

Masters of vessels are permitted to forward messages at an uniform rate of sixpence for each message (including reply) to the Harbour Masters of the various ports, seeking information as to the state of the weather, &c., at the port to which they are bound, or from any port which may lie in their route. These telegrams must be concise, and should be filled in accordance with the directions to be seen at the various telegraph stations.

In no case will a larger number of words than ten in the body of the telegram be followed under these Rules.

#### CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH TELEGRAMS ARE TRANSMITTED, AND TARIFF RATES FOR PLACES BEYOND THE AUSTRALIAN COLONIES.

##### CONDITIONS.

The following are the conditions under which messages will be transmitted on and after 1st January, 1876:—

1. The length of a word is limited to a maximum of ten letters.
2. Only ordinary dictionary words should be used. Artificially-constructed words are subject to the cipher rate.
3. Groups of figures may be transmitted, and will be charged at the rate of five to the word, if expressing ordinary commercial quotations; but if used for code purposes, they will be subject to the cipher rate.
4. Groups of letters or artificially-constructed words will be treated in the same manner as figures.
5. Cipher telegrams must be collated—i.e., repeated back in their entirety from station to station. Half extra rate is charged for collating.
6. Any combination of code employing in the same message groups of figures and letters is strictly prohibited, and telegrams composed in this manner cannot be accepted.
7. Addresses may be written in code, at the sender's risk, under arrangement with the administrations concerned. The signature may also be a code word, or the last word of the message may replace it.
8. The following abbreviated forms for expressing "Reply paid," Acknowledgment of receipt," "Collating," and "Telegram to follow" have been agreed to, so that only one word need be paid for to convey these instructions:—

#### REGISTRATION OF ABBREVIATED ADDRESSES.

General Post Office, London, 1872.

1. On and after this date, a register will be opened at the Central Telegraph Station for the registration of the full address at which telegrams reaching London from the provinces, or from abroad, and marked with an abbreviated or arbitrary address, are to be delivered.
2. The charge for registration will be one guinea per annum, payable in advance, and will become due on the 1st of August in each year. The payment made during the current year will cover the period to the 31st July, 1873.
2. For an address registered in London, the fee of one guinea should be remitted by means of a cheque on a London Bank, crossed "Bank of England," in favour of the Postmaster-General or order, or by Post Office order payable at the Chief Office, London.
4. On and from the 1st of October next, the Postmaster-General will not undertake the delivery of any telegrams at addresses which are not full and complete, or which have not been registered at the General Post Office, or which cannot be traced in the Post Office London Directory, whether the record of the actual address has already been notified to the Post Office or not.



5. In the provinces, and in Scotland and Ireland, the addressees of telegrams may have their address registered at the Chief Office of the Town in which they reside, upon payment at that Office of the registration fee.

Persons in New Zealand desirous of availing themselves of the arrangement above notified should request their correspondents in the United Kingdom to register any abbreviated address that may be agreed upon, at the Chief Office of the Town in which they reside.

1. THE GOVERNMENT LIFE INSURANCE DEPARTMENT issues all desirable forms of policies.
2. THE PAYMENT OF EVERY POLICY IS GUARANTEED BY THE COLONY.
3. DIVISION OF PROFITS.—The surplus or profit is ordered by law to be divided among Policy-holders *only*, and it is to be ascertained every fifth year. The first investigation, with a view to division of profits, is to be made as at June 30th, 1880. The first quinquennial investigation, recently completed, shows a surplus of over £12,000.
4. THE PREMIUMS combine two benefits. They are as low as is consistent with the safety of the Office, and they entitle the Policy-holder to a full share in the profits, who thus secures *from the first* the advantage of a participating policy from 15 to 30 per cent. greater than those of the same kind granted by Private Companies for the same premium.
5. PAYMENT OF PREMIUMS.—The payments may be made during whole term of life, or during a limited period only; at an invariable annual, half-yearly or quarterly, or by a single premium.
6. LIBERAL CONDITIONS as to travelling, residence, &c.:—
  - a. Policy-holders may travel without license or payment of extra premium, or reside in any part of the world, except within 25 degrees of the equator, without license or payment of extra premium.



- b. Policy-holders may change their occupation without license or payment of extra premium.
- c. Death by suicide (except within twelve months of the date of the policy), by duelling, or by the hands of Justice, does not void any policy.
- d. No policy becomes void by any act of the assured, so far as regards the interest of any third persons, provided such act is done without their knowledge, and that they pay the additional premium required, if any, as soon as such act comes to their knowledge.

7. ALL POLICIES, after five years' duration, are INDISPUTABLE and UNCHALLENGEABLE on any grounds whatever connected with the statements on which the assurance was based except fraud, provided the age of the insured has been admitted.

8. ALL POLICIES, after five years' duration, ARE FREED FROM ALL CONDITIONS, except the payment of premium, provided the age of the insured has been admitted, and he has attained thirty years of age, and he has resided continuously within the ordinary limits from the date of the policy. Holders of such policies can voyage or reside in any part of the world, without license or payment of extra premium.

9. PROOF OF AGE.—Age will be admitted at any time on a policy on production of either a certificate of birth or baptism; or, failing these, the best proof that can be procured, such as, for instance, an entry in a family Bible, or a statutory declaration from a relation or friend, stating belief as to age, and grounds of such belief.

10. ALL POLICIES ARE NON-FORFEITABLE after three years to the full extent of their value, under a special regulation providing for the continuance in force of every policy for the original amount, so long as the surrender value of the policy, as defined by the regulation, is not less than the premiums in arrear together with interest at six per cent. per annum, thus giving to every policy-holder a full equivalent for every premium paid. Such policies may be revived even within twelve months after exhaustion of surrender value on proof of unimpaired health, and payment of arrears and fine.

11. SURRENDERS.—Policy-holders, after having been insured for three years, are guaranteed a cash surrender value of about 40 per cent. of the paid-up premiums, provided that no premiums are in arrear, and that the surrender value is not less than £5; but if for any reason the premiums have not been paid when due, a policy free of future premiums will be granted, on application, for such an amount (generally greater than the paid-up premiums) as the surrender value at date of lapse will purchase, provided that such policy is not less than £50, and that application is made within three months.

12. LOANS.—Policy-holders can borrow on the security of their policies to the extent of 90 per cent. of the cash surrender value, provided the loan exceeds £5. The loan agreement for policy-holders and the Department is prepared free of cost, and interest is at present charged at the rate of £7 per cent. per annum, payable half-yearly. Loans can be repaid at any time without previous notice. No loans can be granted on settlement policies under section 16 of "The Government Insurance and Annuities Act, 1874."

13. REVIVAL OF LAPSED POLICIES.—Thirty days of grace are allowed on all Renewal Premiums, and no policy is absolutely forfeited for non-payment of premium unless the premium remains unpaid for twelve months, or the surrender value (if any) has been exhausted for a year. Such policies may be renewed, provided the premiums in arrear and a fine are paid, and the insured is in unimpaired health.

14. POLICIES PROTECTED FROM BANKRUPTCY.—An insurance policy effected by the insured, *bona fide* on his own life, is protected from bankruptcy or insolvency laws to a certain amount, which increases with its duration. Thus, after it has endured for two years, it is protected to the extent of £200:

This protection applies only in favour of the personal representatives of the insured.

15. MARRIED WOMEN MAY EFFECT POLICIES, dispose of the sum assured by will, as if single, and their policies are protected from the debts of their husbands, according to duration, to amounts similar to those stated in clause 14.

16. SETTLEMENT POLICIES.—Policies effected for the benefit of the wife and children of the insured, under section 16 of "The Government Insurance Act, 1874," are from the date of issue absolutely protected from the claims of creditors to the extent of £2000, provided that the premiums are payable during life, or any period not less than seven years; but such policies cannot be surrendered for cash.

17. A POLICY HOLDER may at any time nominate his wife, mother, child, brother, sister, or niece to receive the sum assured payable at his death, provided that it does not exceed £200.

18. PROBATE, &c., DISPENSED WITH.—When a claim under a policy does not exceed £200, the Commissioner may dispense with the production of probate or letters of administration, thus saving great expense to the representatives of the insured.

19. A POLICY HOLDER may at any time direct that, instead of the sum assured being paid at his death, it shall be converted into an annuity payable to a nominee.

20. EXEMPTION FROM STAMP DUTY.—Annuities, policies, powers of attorney authorising the receipt of moneys, and receipts for moneys payable under the Act, are exempted from stamp duty.

21. NO POLICY or Medical Fee charged. Assurances are granted on a single life to the extent of £3000.

22. NOTICES OF ASSIGNMENT are received and registered at the Head Office only. On this subject, attention is requested to the provisions of "The Government Insurance and Annuities Act, 1874."

23. CLAIMS AT DEATH.—Claims are payable by the Regulations one month after proof of death; but in practice they are paid in full as soon as death is proved and the representatives of the deceased are able to discharge the policy.

#### INFORMATION FOR PASSING THE FOLLOWING ENTRIES AT THE CUSTOM HOUSE.

**IMPORTATION.**—Free entries by themselves, three copies—one each for collector, landing surveyor, and landing-waiter. Prime (duty) Entries by themselves, three copies—one each for collector, landing surveyor, and landing waiter. Sight entries, two copies—one each for landing waiter and collector. Warehousing wet and dry goods by themselves, three copies—one each for collector, landing waiter, and locker. An extra copy of any kind addressed "Landing waiter, Lyttelton," of goods to be landed and examined at Lyttelton. Home Consumption Entries, three copies—one each for collector, audit, and locker.

In Home Consumption Entries, value not required.

Sampling entries from the warehouse will be issued by order from the Custom House by triplicate entry—viz., one for the collector, one for the locker, and one for audit. Sample spirits, bottle or less, duty, 2s 6d; do. wine, bottle or less, do. 1s 6d; do. cigars, ½ lb or less, do. 1s 6d; do. tobacco, ¼ lb, do. 1s 6d. The same not to affect the account or clearing from the bonded warehouse.

N.B.—A free sample out of each parcel of goods, if for bonded warehouse, is allowed at time of gauging or examination at Railway Examining Sheds.

Transfer from one warehouse to another in same port, three copies—one each for collector and two lockers, one for delivering warehouse, and the other for receiving warehouse.

**EXPORTATION.**—Export from warehouse, four copies—one each for collector, locker, searcher, and shipping bill. Removals coastwise, ex warehouse, ditto, one additional copy for audit. Export of Free Goods, two copies, but if ships call at other New Zealand ports, three required—one each for collector and searcher. Transshipping Entries, four copies—one each for collector, landing waiter, searcher, and shipping bill. Export for Drawback, four copies—one each for collector, audit, searcher, and shipping bill.

#### GOODS PROHIBITED OR RESTRICTED AS TO IMPORTATION.

Cattle, sheep, swine, prohibited for two years from 15th April, 1877, from countries beyond Australia and Tasmania. [*New Zealand Gazette*, 1877, p. 348.]

Animals, infected; arms and ammunition, except under license; articles, indecent or obscene.

Books, protected by copyright, unless printed in the United Kingdom; books, obscene.

Gold, exportation at ports not approved by the Governor, or contrary to the Governor's regulations.

Tobacco, in ships under 40 tons burthen, or in packages under 60lbs. nett, or in packages with any other goods.

Vultures, any other birds of prey.

**EXPORTATION TARIFF.**—Gold, in its natural state, or mixed with other substances, 2s per ounce troy; gold dust, 2s do.; gold, all other, wrought or unwrought, if produce of the Colony (*vide* "Gold Duty Act," N.Z. Statute), 2s do.; gold coin of the realm, of Foreign States, or gold plate, &c., not produce of the Colony, free; all other goods, free.

## Supreme Court.

### ALLOWANCES TO PROSECUTORS AND WITNESSES IN CRIMINAL PROCEEDINGS.

Persons residing within the Town or City in which the Court is held, or within three miles thereof, for each day's attendance, 5s.

Professional men, when their evidence as experts is required, per diem, 21s.

Persons residing beyond three (3) miles of the Town or City in which the Court is held, for every day's necessary absence from home, 5s.

Witnesses residing beyond three miles from the Town or City in which the Court is held will also be allowed their coach, railway, or steamboat fares, and where there is no public conveyance, will be allowed a mileage rate not exceeding 9d per mile one way. They will also be allowed three shillings in addition for each night they are necessarily detained from their own homes, except when travelling by sea.

Salaried officers of the General Government will not be paid for their time, but only their actual and necessary expenses.

## SCHOOL TICKETS, SEASON TICKETS, EXCURSION AND SPECIAL TRAINS.

**SCHOOL TICKETS.**—School Season Tickets for Children under 16 years of age only will be issued at per quarter, or fractional part of a quarter, irrespective of distance, each 10s. These tickets will terminate on a quarter day, the charge to be the same whether the ticket is taken out at the beginning of the quarter, or at any later date. First-class carriages are not guaranteed, except in the case of girls.

**SCHOOL PARTIES.**—Parties of School Children numbering 20 or upwards can be conveyed by ordinary trains, at per mile, including return, each 3d.; *bona fide* teachers, accompanying the children, each 1½d. First-class tickets will be issued in such cases, but first-class carriages are not guaranteed.

**EXCURSION TRAINS.**—Excursion Trains will be run by special request upon a minimum number of 120 full fare second-class single tickets being taken, such tickets being available for the return journey.

**SPECIAL TRAINS.**—The rate for Special Trains, with one large or two small carriages, per mile, is £1; for every additional carriage, per mile, 5s. The minimum charge for a Special Train is £5. The mileage is counted one way only. Special Trains will be permitted to wait 5 hours at the station of destination, after which period half rates will be charged for the return journey until 7 hours' detention from time of arrival, after which full rates will be charged for the return journey.



**CONSTABLES.**—Constables and their prisoners are allowed to travel free on all railways, without passes.

**FREE PASSES, &c.**—Free Passes, Season, or School Tickets, do not entitle the bearers thereof to travel by Special or Excursion Trains, except the ordinary trains are suspended.

In accordance with By-laws for the New Zealand Railways, fixed by Order in Council, dated the 17th day of April, 1877, the following alterations and additions to the rates for the conveyance delivery, storage of goods, parcels, &c., on all the New Zealand Railways, are hereby declared to be fixed, and shall come into force from the day of the date thereof:—

**PASSENGERS.**—Family season tickets will be issued on application to the Manager at two-thirds the rate of ordinary season tickets. Minimum charge as for four persons.

The rate for special trains with one large or two small carriages to be fifteen shillings (15s.) per mile. For every additional carriage, five shillings (5s.) per mile. Minimum charge, five pounds (£5). Mileage charged one way only.

Season tickets at half ordinary fares will be issued to apprentices and pupil teachers whose age does not exceed 19 years, upon production of satisfactory certificates from their masters or employers that the applicants are actually serving as apprentices or pupil teachers, and that their age is within the prescribed limits.

**GRAIN.**—If bags contain more than 4 bushels, the excess weight will be charged at a rate and a half.

**MISCELLANEOUS.**—The driver of any public vehicle plying for hire within the precincts of any railway will be charged a fee of one pound (£1) for a twelve months' license, to be issued at the option of the Manager. No public vehicle allowed to ply within the limits of the railway without a license.

### Stamp Duties.

**AFFIDAVIT OR DECLARATION** ... .. 2s 6d

#### EXEMPTION—

Declaration made before a Notary of the execution of any deed or other document.

**AGREEMENT**, or any minute or memorandum of an agreement, under hand only, where the matter thereof shall be of the value of £20 or upwards, whether the same shall only be evidence of a contract, or obligatory on the parties from its being a written instrument, together with every schedule, receipt, or other matter put or endorsed thereon or annexed thereto ... .. 1s 0d

Provided always that where divers letters shall be offered in evidence to prove any agreement between the parties who shall have written such letters, it shall be sufficient if any of such letters shall be stamped with a duty of two shillings and sixpence.

An agreement under hand may be stamped by an impressed or an adhesive stamp. Whenever the latter shall be used, one of the parties to the agreement who shall sign the same, shall also at the time of so signing write upon, or across the stamp, his initials and the date of the day and year of writing the same, otherwise the stamp will be of no avail; and proof of the said writing shall be a necessary part of the evidence of the agreement, when not stamped with an impressed stamp.

An agreement under hand may be stamped by the Commissioner within one month after execution, on payment of the duty. After one month and less than three months, on payment of twenty per cent. in addition to duty; and after three months on payment of duty and a fine of £5.

### BILLS OF EXCHANGE—

**INLAND BILL OF EXCHANGE, DRAFT, OR ORDER**, for the payment to the bearer or to order, at any time otherwise than on demand, of any sum of money not exceeding £50 ... .. 1s 0d  
Ditto, not exceeding £100 ... .. 2s 0d  
And where the same shall exceed £100, then for every £50, and also for any fractional part of £50 ... .. 1s 0d

**FOREIGN BILL OF EXCHANGE** drawn, but payable out of the Colony of New Zealand—

If drawn single or otherwise than in a set of two or more, same duty as on Inland Bill of same amount and tenor.  
If drawn in sets of two, then for every Bill of each set where the sum payable shall not exceed £50 ... .. 0s 6d  
And where it shall exceed £50, and not exceed £100 ... .. 1s 0d  
And where the same shall exceed £100, then for every £50, and also any fractional part of £50 ... .. 0s 6d  
If drawn in sets of three or more, for every Bill of each set where the sum payable thereby shall not exceed £50 ... .. 0s 4d  
And where it shall exceed £50 and not exceed £100 ... .. 0s 8d  
And where the same shall exceed £100, then for every £50, and also any fractional part of £50 ... .. 0s 4d

Inland Bills drawn and payable within the Colony, if drawn in sets of two or more, pay duty at the same rates as Foreign Bills drawn in sets.

Bills of Exchange drawn out of the Colony, but endorsed or negotiated within the Colony, the same duty as on a Bill of Exchange drawn within the Colony, and payable within the Colony.

Bills of Exchange payable on demand, which shall be endorsed out of the Colony, or purport to be so endorsed, wheresoever the same may have been drawn, but paid within the Colony ... .. 0s 1d

### MODE OF STAMPING AND CANCELLING—

An impressed stamp may be used, which need not be cancelled; but if an adhesive stamp be made use of, the person using the same must, at the same time, write on the stamp his name, or initials, with the date of the month and year of using the same; or these particulars may be stamped or impressed in ink thereon provided that the stamp be effectually obliterated so that it cannot be used again. In the case of Bills of Exchange the stamp must be cancelled by the acceptor; Promissory Notes by the drawer. This clause does not apply to Bills or promissory Notes drawn out of the Colony.



Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, Drafts, or Orders, made within the Colony, cannot be stamped after the making thereof.

Foreign Bills of Exchange or Promissory Notes are to be stamped with adhesive stamps by the holder before he shall present the same for payment, or endorse, transfer, or in any manner negotiate it; and if it purports to be one of a set, it shall be stamped with the duty payable upon the set; and before he shall deliver it out he shall cancel the stamp by writing on it his initials, or those of his firm, and the date upon which he shall so write the same. In default, he will incur a penalty of £50, and any person receiving such Bill, &c., unstamped, shall not be entitled to recover thereon; but if such Bill, &c., be stamped, but not cancelled, the holder may cancel the stamp. Drawing, &c., Bills purporting to be in a set, but not drawing the whole set, incurs a penalty of £50.

**BILL OF LADING**, or receipt in lieu thereof, from the master, mate, or agent of any vessel, for any goods, merchandise, or effects, to be carried to any place beyond the boundaries of the Colony—

For every such Bill of Lading, or Receipt, or copy thereof ... 1s 0d

Bills of Lading must be stamped with an impressed stamp. The penalty for signing an unstamped Bill of Lading is £50.

**BILLS OF SALE**—If absolute—See "Conveyance." If by way of Mortgage—Exempt.

**BONDS** are not specially charged with duty, and therefore fall under the description of Deeds not otherwise described, and unless exempt, are liable as such to duty of ten shillings, and the fines and other provisions applicable to Deeds. See "Deeds."

Various Bonds are expressly exempted in the schedule to the Act.

**EXEMPTIONS—**

All Bonds and Mortgages, whether affecting real or personal estate, Bills of Sale by way of Mortgage, and all Transfers, Agreements, Releases, Re-conveyances, and Discharges thereof.

All Bonds to her Majesty.

A penalty of £20 is imposed for paying interest on unstamped Bonds, Debentures, or other securities, which may be chargeable with stamp duty.

**CHARTER PARTY** is not expressly charged with stamp duty, but liable to duty as an agreement. It may be, but is not usually, under seal. A charter party is not, however, liable to the same conditions as a simple agreement as regards the mode of stamping. It may be written on an impressed stamp, or stamped as an agreement with an adhesive stamp, at the time of making it; but if not stamped at that time, it may be brought to the Commissioners within seven days of first execution, and it may then be stamped by them on payment of the duty, and a fine of ten shillings; after seven days, and within one calendar month, on payment of the duty and a penalty of ten pounds. After a month it cannot be stamped. When an adhesive stamp is used it must be cancelled by the person who first executes the document.

**CHEQUES**—Draft or Order, including cheques or orders on bankers for the payment of any sum of money to a payee named, or to bearer, or to order, on demand ... 0s 1d

The stamp may be impressed or adhesive; but if adhesive it must be cancelled by writing the drawer's initials and the date upon it.

**EXEMPTIONS**—Cheques, Drafts, or Orders for the payment or transmission of public money by or on behalf of her Majesty the Queen, or by or on behalf of the Governor or Colonial Treasurer.

**CONVEYANCE**—(For mode and time allowed for stamping, see "Deed.")—Of any kind or description whatsoever upon the sale of any property, in respect of the principal or only writing whereby the property sold shall be conveyed to, or vested in the purchaser, or any other person or persons by his direction (except transfers expressly provided for by this Act)—

Where the purchase or consideration money therein or thereupon expressed shall not exceed £50 ... 5s 0d

And where the same shall exceed £50, and not exceed £100 ... 10s 0d

And where the same shall exceed £100, then for every £50, and any fractional part of £50 ... 5s 0d

**EXEMPTIONS**—Any Grant from the Crown of Crown lands in New Zealand, and any instrument dedicating free and perpetual right of way to the public, for religious, charitable, or educational purposes.

**COUNTERPART** or Duplicate of any instrument chargeable with duty, where such duty does not amount to 2s 6d, same duty as original instrument; in any other case ... 2s 6d

For this purpose a denoting stamp, with the word "Counterpart," is made use of, and must be impressed at the Stamp Office; subject, as to time and fines, to the same condition as other Deeds.

**DEBENTURES** are not expressly charged with stamp duty in the Colony. The duty to which they may be liable will depend, therefore, upon the form in which they may be drawn up. They will probably be liable as Bills of Exchange.

A penalty of £20 is imposed for paying interest on unstamped debentures chargeable with stamp duty.

Government Debentures and Treasury Bills are exempt.

**DEEDS** not otherwise charged ... 10s 0d

**DEED**—Regulations as to stamping—

Deeds may be written on parchment or paper previously impressed with a stamp of the required amount. Any deed or instrument liable to stamp duty, written on parchment or paper, and signed or executed before it shall be duly stamped, the whole, or the deficiency, of stamp duty shall be paid to the Commissioners, and if stamped within one month after execution, no fine shall be charged; and if such Deed shall be presented to be stamped more than one month and less than three months after execution, a fine shall be paid of 20 per cent. on the value of the stamps to be affixed, but if presented more than three months after execution a fine at the rate of 100 per cent. on the value of the stamps to be affixed, but in no case shall the last-mentioned fine be less than the sum of £5. But in the case of a Deed executed out of the Colony, no fine is payable if presented within three months after it is received in the Colony. The Commissioners will then stamp the Deed with the proper stamp, and also with the stamp denoting that the fine has been paid; and no Deed can be pleaded in evidence, either at law or in equity, until duly stamped, except upon the production of any



such document as evidence in any proceeding (not criminal), the officer of the Court whose duty it is to read such document, shall call attention to any omission or insufficiency of the stamp, and such document shall not be received in evidence until any duty and fine required shall have been paid. The officer aforesaid shall receive the duty and fine, and give a receipt for them, whereupon such documents shall be admissible in evidence (saving other objections). The officer shall account to Commissioners as provided. Provided that this provision shall not apply to any document expressly prohibited to be stamped after execution.

The registration of unstamped Deeds is also prohibited.

**FRAUDULENT REMOVAL** of stamps for the purpose of using them again, or any act, contrivance, or device with intent to defraud Her Majesty of duty, incur a penalty, on conviction, of seven years' penal servitude, or imprisonment with hard labour for any term not exceeding four years. Forging a die or stamp, or fraudulent removal and second use of a stamp, are declared to be felonies.

**IMPRESSED STAMPS** need not be cancelled, and must not be removed for use as adhesive stamps. Incorporated Companies to take out yearly Licenses on 1st January. First license may be issued to any Company at any time during the year, but continues in force only till end of year. Certain Companies are exempt.

**I O U**—A simple I O U, without conditions, or anything that might constitute it a promissory note, or an agreement, is not liable to stamp duty. [No authority for this in New Zealand Act, but it is according to precedent in England.]

**LEASE, OR AGREEMENT** for a lease, or any written document for the tenancy or occupancy of any lands, tenements, or hereditaments, without any consideration by way of premium, the following duties in respect of the yearly rent—

**LEASE, OR AGREEMENT** for a lease of any lands, tenements, or hereditaments, granted in consideration of a sum of money, by way of premium, without rent, or with an annual rent—The *ad valorem* duties payable upon a conveyance calculated on the consideration by way of premium expressed therein.

**LEASE** of any lands, tenements, or hereditaments, granted in consideration of a sum of money, by way of premium, and also of a yearly rent amounting to £20 and upwards—Both the *ad valorem* duties payable upon a conveyance, according to the consideration therein expressed, and for a lease in consideration of a rent of the same amount.

**MEMORANDUM OF LEASE** in Schedule E of "The Land Transfer Act, 1870," and every transfer or surrender thereof—The same duty as on a lease.

**TRANSFER OF LEASE OF ENCUMBRANCE** in Schedule H of "The Land Transfer Act, 1870."—The same duty as for a conveyance on the sale of any property.

**EXEMPTIONS** from the preceding duties on leases—Leases granted by the Crown of any waste lands under the provisions of any Waste Lands Act, or Gold Fields Act.

**MAILS**—Contracts, agreements, and bonds, for conveyance of mails are exempt.

**MEMORANDUM OF TRANSFER** in Schedule D of "The Land Transfer Act, 1870."

Where the transfer is not a transfer on a sale or exchange of the property therein—The same duty as for a conveyance on the sale of any property

Where the transfer is not a transfer on a sale or exchange of the property therein ... 10s 0d

**POLICIES** insuring the holder against risk of loss or damage by fire, and policies of assurance on lives of persons effecting the same, are exempt.

**POLICY OF INSURANCE (MARINE)**—

For every policy of sea insurance on any voyage—

For every £100 and any fractional part of £100 thereby insured 1s 0d

For every policy of sea insurance for time—Notaries Act Stamp may be affixed by Notary, and if so, must be cancelled by same.

For every £100 and any fractional part of £100 thereby insured—

Where the insurance shall be made for any time not exceeding six months ... 1s 0d

Where the insurance shall be made for any time exceeding six months and not exceeding twelve months ... 2s 0d

But if the separate and distinct interests of two or more persons shall be insured by one policy for a voyage or for time, then the duty of one shilling, or the duty of one shilling or two shillings, as the case may be, shall be charged thereon in respect of every full sum of one hundred pounds, and every fractional part of one hundred pounds thereby insured upon any separate or distinct interest.

Sea insurance for a voyage and for time, to recover any time beyond twenty-four hours from arrival and mooring of the ship, shall be charged duty both for voyage and time.

Sec. 87 defines, "sea insurance" and "policy." By Sec. 89, all sea insurance must be by policy, and specify the risk or adventure, names of underwriters, and sums insured, or policy will be void; Sec. 90, no policy must be for longer time than twelve months, or it will be void.

Marine policies may be stamped within fourteen days after date and first signature without penalty. After fourteen days and within thirty days, on payment of duty and ten pounds penalty; after thirty days they cannot be stamped if executed within the Colony.

**PROMISSORY NOTE**, for the payment in any other manner than to the bearer on demand of any sum of money not exceeding £25 ... 0s 6d

Exceeding £25, and not exceeding £50 ... 1s 0d

Promissory Note for the payment either to the bearer on demand, or in any other manner than to the bearer on demand, of any sum of money exceeding £50 and not exceeding £100 ... 2s 0d

Where the sum shall exceed £100, then for every £50 and fractional part of £50 ... 1s 0d

Promissory Note payable on demand ... 0s 1d



Promissory Note made, or purporting to be made, out of the Colony, but endorsed, negotiated, or paid within the Colony, the same duty as on an Inland Bill, payable to bearer or to order at any time otherwise than on demand.

The duties on such Foreign Promissory Notes shall be noted by adhesive stamps, to be affixed and cancelled in the same manner and under the same penalties as the duties on Foreign Bills of Exchange.

For mode of stamping and cancelling Promissory Notes, see "Bills of Exchange."

RECEIPT given for or on payment of any sum of money of the amount of £2 or upwards. ... 0s 1d

The term "receipt" shall mean and include any note, memorandum, or writing whatsoever whereby any money amounting to £2 or upwards, is acknowledged or expressed to have been received or deposited, or paid or taken, or whereby any debt, claim, or demand, or any part of any debt, claim or demand, of the amount of £2, or upwards, is acknowledged to have been settled, discharged, or satisfied, or which signifies or imports any such acknowledgment, settlement, or extinguishment, and whether such receipt is or is not signed with the name of any person.

Clause 96 states if any person, in any case where a receipt would be liable to duty, refuses to give a receipt duly stamped, or upon payment to the amount of £2 and upwards, gives a receipt for a sum not amounting to £2, or separates or divides the amount paid, with intent to evade duty, he shall forfeit a sum not exceeding £10.

#### MODE OF STAMPING AND CANCELLING—

An impressed stamp may be used, which need not be cancelled; but if an adhesive stamp be made use of, the person using the same must, at the same time, write on the stamp his name or initials, or those of his firm, with the date of the month and year of using the same; or these particulars may be stamped or impressed in ink thereon, provided that the stamp be effectually obliterated so that it cannot be used again.

Any person giving an unstamped receipt for the sum of £2, or upwards renders himself liable to a penalty of £10; also, any person evading the stamp duty by dividing or separating the amount, or otherwise, renders himself liable to a penalty of £10.

An unstamped receipt cannot be received in evidence (except on a criminal charge) until the duty and a fine have been paid to the Clerk of the Court.

#### EXEMPTIONS FROM THE PRECEDING DUTIES ON RECEIPTS—

Receipts given for or upon the payment of money to or for the use of or by or on behalf of Her Majesty; Receipts endorsed upon any instrument duly stamped under this Act acknowledging the receipt of the consideration money therein expressed; Acknowledgment given for money deposited in any bank to be accounted for; Receipts for moneys paid into Land, Building, Provident, Friendly, Industrial, Fire and Life Insurance Societies; Receipts for deposit in any Post Office, or other Savings Bank, established pursuant to any Act of the General Assembly.

SPOILED STAMPS—All applications for the allowance of spoiled stamps must be made to the Commissioners (or Deputy), accompanied by an affidavit, the form of which can be obtained at the Stamp Office.

TRANSFER OF PASTORAL RUNS—Transfer, except by way of mortgage, of any run or station held under lease or license, or promise of lease or license, from the Crown, or of any interest therein, not exceeding upon the whole consideration agreed to be paid £100 ... 10s 0d  
And where such value shall exceed £100, then for every £100 and any fractional part of £100 ... 10s 0d

TRANSFER of any share or shares in the stock and funds of any corporation, company, or society whatever, in New Zealand, upon sale thereof (*impressed stamps must be used in all cases*) when brought to Stamp Office—

Where the purchase or consideration money therein expressed shall not exceed £20 ... 1s 0d  
Exceeding £20 and not exceeding £50 ... 2s 6d  
Exceeding £50 and not exceeding £100 ... 5s 0d  
For every additional £50 or fractional part of £50 ... 2s 6d
