Note.—This Gazette contains the substance of Informations received in cases of Felony and of Misdemeanors and against Receivers of stolen goods, reputed Thieves and Offenders escaped from custody, with the time, place, and circumstances of the Offence; the Names of persons known, but not in custody, who are charged with Offences, and descriptions of those who are not known, their appearance, dress, and other marks of identity; the Names of Accomplices and Accessories, with every particular which may lead to their apprehension; a description, as accurate as possible, of property that has been stolen, and a minute description of stolen horses, &c., for the purpose of tracing and recovering them.

Rewards for the discovery of Illicit Distillation Extract from the *New Zealand Gazette*, No. 63, November 11, 1868, page 529.

It is hereby notified that Rewards varying in amount from five pounds to fifty pounds, will be given for such information as may lead to the detection and conviction of persons engaged in illicit distillation.

The Rewards will vary in amount in proportion to the importance of the seizure, will be payable on conviction being obtained, and will be in addition to the portion of the fine, or of the proceeds of the seizure, which by law is to be paid to the person affording the information.

Information may be given to any Collector of Customs or Officer of Police throughout the Colony. The name of the person giving the information will not be divulged except with his own consent.

The members of the Force in charge of the several sub-districts will, in every instance when immediate action is not necessary, forward a full report of all cases of illicit distillation that may come to their knowledge to the Commissioner of Police, and await instructions from him before they take steps to prosecute the offenders. But in all urgent cases that immediate action may be taken, the Police must lose no time in first communicating the particulars to the nearest Collector of Customs, and subsequently to the Commissioner of Police.

Stolen.

STOLEN from the Royal Hotel, Timaru, between the 25th June and 2nd July, 1869, the property of John Guthrie Hughes, one brown cloth overcoat, lined with black quilted silk; three dark tweed vests, having a blue mixture woven in the cloth; one pair of brown tweed trowsers; one helmet-shaped coal scuttle.

STOLEN from the Royal Hotel, Timaru, on the 30th ult., the preperty of Mary Ann Johnson, a Colonial gold brooch, oval, two inches in diameter, flowered round the edges, small bunch of red coral set in the centre.

The dwelling of Frederick Holmes at Riccarton, was feloniously entered at 3 p.m. on the 15th ult., and a silver lever hunting watch stolen therefrom, No. 1118, Graham, maker, London, second hand missing, attached was a short steel chain, with long, single

An Inquest was held at the Arowhenua, on the 30th June, 1869, before B. Woollcombe, Esq., Coroner, on the body of Elizabeth Horsfall, aged 38 years. Verdict:—Died from disease of the heart.

An Inquest was held at Christchurch, on the 19th ultimo, before J. W. S. Coward, Esq., Coroner, on the body of Margaret Currie, aged 3 years. Verdict:—Accidental death.

An Inquest was held at the Criterion Hotel, Christchurch, on the 23rd ultimo, before J. W. S. Coward, Esq., Coroner, on the body of an illegitimate unbaptized female child of one Annie Wilson. Verdict:—Not sufficient evidence to show the child was born alive.

Information is requested respecting William Mourn, late gunner in the Royal Artillery, who purchased his discharge about eight months ago; was last seen in Sydney about three weeks ago. Mourn is about 30 years of age, 5 feet 8 or 9 inches high, stout build, thick neck, fresh complexion, hair nearly black, large black curly beard, whiskers and moustache, light blue eyes, a labourer, has been working on the wharfs. Information is requested respecting Patrick O'Grady, who left Galway 8 or 9 years ago for Melbourne, and was afterwards employed by a firm named Hare and Hether (latter name uncertain), in Lamplough. His father is Martin O'Grady, a non-commissioned officer now stationed at Halifax, Nova Scotia, formerly in the Royal Irish Constabulary. In 1859 or 1860, one Patrick O'Grady, formerly employed by Messrs. Foot and Heather left Maryborough for Melbourne. He was then 21 years old, 5 feet, 7 inches high, fair hair and complexion.—21st June, 1869.

Missing from Christchurch, Canterbury, New Zealand, since the 15th August, Ellen M. Smith. On the 15th October she was seen in Sydney, and left for Melbourne per "You Yangs." She is aged 24, 5 feet 1 or 2 inches high, medium build, dark hair, fair complexion, round features, short pug nose, very dark eyes, square shoulders, rather short neck. She is likely to have been confined since she came to Melbourne. William Henry Smith offers £20 for the discovery of her whereabouts.—21st June, 1869.

ANTHONY KNIPE, by trade a carpenter, who left Port Natal in March 1865 for the Mauritius, in the schooner "Mary," and from thence to Adelaide in the same vessel. He left directions that his letters should be forwarded to Mr. Smith, United States Consul at Port Adelaide, who states that he knows nothing about him. The schooner "Mary" went to Melbourne and was sold there. Information respecting the above is sought at the instance of the Colonial Secretary, Cape Town.

INFORMATION is requested respecting John Moore, per "William Jardine," 1838; 17 years of age, 5 feet 2½ inches high on arrival, pale complexion, dark brown hair, hazel eyes, much inflamed, blue illegible marks inside lower right arm, blue scar on back of fore and middle fingers of right hand, large brown blotch on right shin; native of Dublin, a sweep, received ticket of leave for Braidwood District in the year 1845. He was subsequently working in the Pomahaka District, also at Weatherstones and other parts of Otago. The last letter received by his mother from him was, Moke Creek, Lake Wakatipu District, and bore date September 3, 1868.

Information is requested respecting one Joseph Neno Carter, formerly of Queen's County, Ireland, aged 47, about 6 feet 4 inches, and of proportionately heavy build, dark hair inclining to grey, probably dyed, heavy eyebrows, thick lips, and long nose, was in the Victorian Police Force, in 1853-4, and subsequently returned to England. Arrived in Dunedin from Melbourne about the middle of 1863, and a few months after left for Canterbury or one of the Northern Provinces.
