John Harper was also proprietor of the line of Ferry Road coaches prior to the tram and died on the SS Taieroa when it sank in 1886. Randolph Harper spent the whole of his life in Canterbury. On leaving school he worked on his father's farm. When this property was sold for subdivision, Randolph Street was named after him. It was in the district of Ashbourne.
