

then brought forward the question "That Charles I was exclusively blame for the commencement of the civil war," opening it in the affirmative -

Messrs Bowes, & Newton, Al. Newton, Beynon, & Cuff spoke in the negative. Mr Cuff replied. The chairman having summed up, the question was put, when eight (8) voted in the affirmative and four (4) in the negative,

Mr R. W. Morley was appointed to open the next question "That Cromwell was justified morally in putting Charles I to death."

The Society met at the usual hour Dr Foster in the chair.

Present Messrs, & Newton, Madam, A & Newton Shackleton, Bowes, Guthrie, Beynon Mr Fisher, Woodham, Alice & J. Foster Hewitt, Rev R. W. Morley Menee, Dawson de Gans Grimes, & Pringle

Mr Beynon, Treasurer, made a statement to the Society showing the liabilities incurred by the Committee in the matter of the Conversation, Mr Guthrie then moved "That the Society authorise the Committee to negotiate in the matter of removing the place of meeting" Seconded by Mr Shackleton -

Mr Shackleton moved, and Mr Beynon seconded as an amendment

"That the Society authorise the Committee to make the necessary arrangements for removing the place of meeting" The Amendment was carried unanimously Mr Morley challenged Mr Bowes for the next discussion

Mr Morley then brought forward the question "That Cromwell was justified morally in putting Charles I to death" opening it in the affirmative Mr Pringle spoke in the affirmative & Messrs Shackleton, Beynon, & Al. Newton spoke in the neg. Mr Morley replied & the chairman having summed up 5 voted in favour & 6 against the motion -
