

Sainte France May 1533

May 2 I left Harroch on Tuesday May 2nd after 11 o'clock train. In Lourdes I did some shopping, & dined with the Alpine Club & went to lectures on Plutonism & caught the 11 o'clock night train to Paris.

3. I had several things done in Paris & took to get for various people.

Paris 4 in the end I stayed the night.

4. I left the Gare d'Orsay at 8:55, train not full, all crowded very difficult my journey up from Poitiers to Périgueux between Afles Chaleins River it's very beautiful country. After Poitiers I took the County Street. I got to Cahors at 7 & went to a little inn. Hotel des Grèves.

Cahors 5. I went out & saw Cahors & got some photos I wanted & had dinner at the Restaurant de la Comédie Comédie - when I got as good bread as before. I went back & bought & carry to the train 7-Vers

Vers 6 stopped at the Hotel d'Orsay

6. I got off at 8:15 - having news of my things at the inn & walked up the valley of the Vézère to Le Puy-Sainte-Sauveur - the spring where the Romans had dug a aqueduct to Cahors & then climbed up to the old Gallo-Roman Oppidum of Murus. The earthworks were in pretty good preservation - about 6 Kilometers round but I could not find any of the walls showing & clear work. I got back at 1:45 with a blister on my foot. After lunch I had a sleep. There a thunderstorm came on & it's still pelted down. It first cleared off & then came back the Anti-Cabrières which I reached at 5:20. I sat at a table & walked up to the Deck-Merle. The paintings were very good. I saw handprints - I had not seen before. also a footprint of a woman & child which had set brick here. The skulls of several canaries & nests where the bird cleopatra had been scraped of nails. I left at 7 & took the last bus to the church - it is reckoned for the Romanesque - & caught the Anti-Cabrières & the 8:10 train to Cahors.

7. I caught the 6:10 to Toulouse & stopped to Hotel Compagnie du Midi. Very noisy with the trains. After ^{breakfast} I went to the St. Sernin Church for service. The singing was very Gregorian but the

boys voices were very untrained. The tower 213ft high is very fine. The lower rooms with round head doors XIII cent. the two upper ones for 1250. It is said to be the most perfect Romanesque building in France. The Porte Nigelle on the S. side of the nave has carvings remains and a post. The church is practically unchanged since 1271. The double arched interior is exceptionally wide (106 ft) for so early a church. The choir seats (1670) are good. & various vestments. Christ not behind the High Altar in the Ambulatory long XII cent. work in the Byzantine style. Then went to the Musée St. Raymond. Some fine XV cent. iron work. The more interesting thing was part of a bronze chalice from FA (Aude) & Gaullist collar & bracelets of gold. I went back for lunch & had a sleep & then set again. It comes on to rain hard & having no macintosh I was half drowning coffee in restaurants. I had dinner out & walked back thru the fair to the station.

May 8 up in good time & out, the agave I will find & the Cathedrals after that and the buttresses between the windows can be seen stony towers in some cases blocking the light of the windows. Outside of it is more prettier the west end has ^{nothing} towers on the N. side & the roof is nicely leaded to. The choir is cut on the same axis as the nave. Inside the most interesting thing is the tapestries made from 1533. I went back & by 7:30 am "indication" of Paris from Agence Havas & walked slowly back to the hotel to catch the 11:20 & found that my ticket had stopped to 10:30! I waited till 4 & caught a fast train to Clermont.

In the same compartment was also Mme. Camille & girls school except ~~Camille~~ they seemed rather old. They had come from Angoulême for the day. The Pyrenees after 50 miles away stood up well. As my train I saw the ^{nothing} ^{nothing}

May 9 I went to the Jardin des Plantes & the Musée des Beaux-Arts.

In the morning after visiting the Syndicalist exhibition & still being unable to get an indication for Paris. I went to the Clé. Most remarkable I walked round the P.W. fortifications took photo & walked about I went into St. Nazaire very beautiful & grand. The new plain Romanesque of 1095 & the choir built 1300. The rose windows of the S. transept is curiously fitted into a pointed arch opening. The south pier of the transept carries four statues at the top. A carillon carved stone of the Siege of 1215 rung every hour. Went to a little restaurant "Le Dauphin" Rue St. Georges near the Rue Narbonne.
