

Thur. Nov. 29. In the morning we went out & I saw Mr. Aspinwall (from Kawau) & several members of his association came for a evening meeting. After dinner I set off at 2.30 & went up the ridge on the Pakaraka Gorge up the "Corkscrew". I saw a lot of Colomys. Some of them the bush (black) marked. As soon as I turned back I saw 6 or 7 gr. L. Moretonis. I found they some eggs & better but they were not like many others. They told me that the eggs had been set aside for the S. Parrot before me so when I got to Hobbiton I sent a p. o. to theophany. There was a clear road which was about except for one or two places it had been cut up & dried in horse trails. I got to Lake Lyndon about 5.30 & saw his rising so I stopped & put my rod together. As I got higher up the road dropped & presently began to blow hard making small waves & I never saw a greater gale or felt one. I drove on to the Hobbiton Road & had been out of fuel - pump it broke, so I put my rod away & drove on to Lake Rotoiti & crossed it as it was getting dark. I took my little tent & got water & made all snug & took two bread & butter & eggs & tea. When we got back I took Swaggers come up & I found them still dry & ready to use. The wheels they were very greasy. They three would & I found in 1000 feet finding my air helmet very comfortable. About 5 hours

Fri. Nov. 30. I got up at 5.30 & had breakfast. When I looked up at the time I saw 2 Colomys just close by. I was up now & shot at them & so as I waited for the sun to go up as they drew. All the gear on the ground of "Colombus" are put up now & are great conveniences. I carried my "Swaggers" & saw them off; one standing on each running board. & driving as far as I could. It was another very hot day & I don't say shirt sleeve. I got to the Bealey at 11 & had tea & got out the time in a very hot place. I had stopped my two Swaggers just before the Bealey as I knew the present position is letter green. I picked them up again on the other side of the river

& took them along. We got to the time & found a great many trampers near where the burnout begins & then I left them & started down the road. We stopped here & ran them along to the top of the descent - when I left them as the great dam is steep & the surface rather loose. I went down carefully but without anything apparently difficult. & I stopped for no time. The bush was looking very well in need of rain. I went down the road noticing a good many frogs but all cleaned & how I found as I had them to eat they are crusty & are very sour at times. I ran out of petrol & had to get off from my spear case. I had afternoon tea at Jackson's the hotel opposite Jackson's Station (the old Jackson is dead - which am) & there I was in hearing the fire alarm before I dinner time. At the junction here I turned left & took the short-cut & came out the bush & got to Hobbiton at 4. I found the doctor was there & got things off the car.

Sat Dec. 1. Went up the time & left my car at Kawau for a few hours to repair & to be greased. He saw Mr. Williams & called on Mr. Knight - the Vicar an old commandant man who now does not preach. Cleaned the car in the afternoon & was as I had been with dear Leamont. The D. showed us some slides in the evening.

Sun. Dec. 2. Met H. P. Dunn and Henry Anderson at 11. Took Kawau 20.2.30. See with the Knights - & walked in the evening. Was in 1st Rodfords. At 4 bought a fire for the River that day.

Mon. Dec. 3. Redford took me out to see the dogs. Mrs. Leamont I then went back to him & opened an account at the Bank of N.Z. After dinner I went up & did as a few things & had a sleep - wrote letters & packed with the car.

Tues. Dec. 4. Went out shopping, saw Armstrong also - fishing. Met with Mackay dinner with the Alice-club. Margaret & Walker being the guests.

Wed. Dec. 5. In the morning went across to the aerodrome had a cup of tea with Mr. Reuter met - Macrae & Rod Aspinwall. After we left Kaitangiri & saw them & Dall, John Cropp, the Spences, Amor Ball & Perry off. Took car to Kawau again for dinner. The Kaitangiri & K.O.Katchi have given training. What I noted most was the dry birds instead of the stones
