oilskin & the rain had ceased. We saw several moose tracks
along the track. After we were on the main trail, I halted
in a place to take off my stockings & change my boots &
bring up my stockings, I walked several hours comfortably
on the log bed. had to arrange all the food after that
so that my left leg was in the water! About 1.30
Scott had us with the horses & we got to his tent at 2.15 -
& had a good meal. We set off again, I called to see
Mr. S. case. Cook's den was deep mud. He could not see
the car. had a boy that was waiting to get down to
