Furniture for Reading Room. Moved by The Rev^r. C. Alabaster and seconded by the Rev^r. C. Frazer That in accordance with an application from the Treasurer he shall be empowered to expend a sum not exceeding £15 in furniture for the Library and Reading Room.

Carried unanimously
Appointment of Sublibrarian confirmed. The Treasurer and Librarian reported to the Committee that they had appointed W^r. C. J. Reader to be Clerk and Sub-librarian to the Institute. Which appointment was unanimously confirmed.

Treasurers report. The Treasurer reported that subscriptions from forty five annual members had been received.

Librarians Report. The Librarian reported that some of the Colonial News-papers had been received and that the English Periodicals would be ordered by the next Mail.

Loans to the Library not to be in circulation. Moved by Mr. Lock and seconded by Mr. J. Johnstone, That Books lent to the Library of the Institute shall not be circulated without the special consent of the owners. Carried nem. con.

Purchase of Books. The Librarian applied for leave to expend a certain portion of the funds for the purchasing of Books should any opportunity of so doing occur.

Moved by Mr. G. Miles and seconded by the Rev^r. Charles Alabaster, That the sum of £10 (ten pounds) be so applied and that the Rev^r. C. Frazer, C. Alabaster and Messrs. Miles and Lock do act as
