*Summary of the verbal report
made by the Rev^d Charles Frazer on
behalf of the Educational Sub-committee
and referred to in the foregoing minutes
of the Quarterly General Meeting dated
December 30th 1859.*

Mr. Frazer stated that the Sub-committee had not lately had an opportunity of making known their arrangements, to the General Committee; from the impossibility of getting a quorum at the stated monthly meetings.

Public intimation had been given through the Press, and by papers on the Notice Board in the Reading Room, that they were prepared to form Elementary Classes, and also some of a higher kind if any were desirous of joining them.

The Rev^d Charles Alabaster had undertaken to deliver a public lecture and a series of eleven private lectures to a class, on English Constitutional History.

In consequence of the large attendance these had assumed the character of public Lectures through-out; and had put the Sub-committee in possession of funds more than sufficient to cover their expenses.
