Persons residing upon mail routes requiring the nccommodation of private bags can obtain the same upon payment, in ndvance, of the undermentioned fees to the Chief or Head Postmaster of the district, and subject to the following regulations :-

The fees payable for private mail bags shall be-Fora term exceeding six calendar months, and not exceeding one year, two pounds (£2); for a term not exceeding six calendar months, one pound ( $£ 1$ ). Provided that no private mril bag shall be let save for a term ending on the 30th day of June or the 31st day of December next after the day on which
the same shall be let. the same shall be let.
The bag must be of leather, with a lock and two keys,
kept in repair at the cost of the person requiring it.
A mail contractor is bound to convey and deliver, free of charge, all private bags given to him by Postmasters, but is not required to deviate from the prescribed mail route, and is on no account whe the Contractor is not required oag not be rea
to wait for it.

## UNCLATMED LETTERS.

On the first day of each month a list is exhibited at each Post Office in the Colony of the addresses of all letters received from places beyond the Colony that have remained unclaimed for one month at such Post Office ; and such of these letters as remain unclaimed at the end of a further period of two months are then forwarded to the Dead Letter Office, to be returned unopened to the countries where they originated. Cnclaimed letters originating in the Colony are not advertised, but at the end of two months are forwarded to the
Letter Office, Wellington, there to be opened and returned to the writers.

## Rates of Postage, and Conditions of Transmission.

All letters, newspapers, book and pattern parcels, and prices current, posted in New Zealand, must be prepaid by postage stamps.

## INLAND LETTERS.

Late letters for despatch by steamers will be received until within twenty minutes of the despatch from the Post Office, provided such letters bear, in addition to the full postage, a further single rate of postage as a late fee:

Letters re-directed from one part of the Colony to another are chargeable with fresh rates of postage, as if they were then posted for the first time, propayment being optional.

LETTERS FOR PLACES BEYOND THE COLONY.
Late letters for places beyond the Colony will be received until twenty minntes before the hour of despatch from the Post Office, provided such letters bear in addition to the full postage, a further single rate of postage as a lat.
fee. Late letters placed on board steamers must also bear, in addition to the full postage, a further single rate of postage as a lute fee.

## POST CARDS.

Penny Post Cards for transmission between places in New Zealand, and also to certain other places hereafter mentioned, at letter rates.

The front or stamped side of the card is for the address only, and beyond the printed or written address, nothing whatever must be printed or written upon that side of the card. On the reverse side, any communication, whether of the
nature of a letter or otherwise, may be printed or written, Nothing whatever may be attached to the card, nor may it be folded, cut, or otherwise altered. If any of the above conditions be infringed, the card shall be charged one penny
on delivery.

Any post card olverved to bear upon it anything of an obscene, libellous, or obviously objectionable nature, will be detained and sent to the Dead Letter Office for disposal

## INLAND PATIERN AND SAMPLE AND PAREEL POST.

The following are the rules of the inland pattern and sample and parcel
(1.) A pattern sample or parcel packet may contain patterns, samples, or articles of merchundise, goods sent for sale or in execution of an order, or any articles sent by one private individual to another; seeds,
cuttings, bulbs, roots, and scions may also be forwarded.
(2.) The postage is one penny not exceeding two ounced exceeding four ounces; and one penny for every twopence not ounces or fraction of two ounces.
(3.) No packet must exceed two feet in lempth or feot in with or depth, nor mast it exceed five pounds in werth or one foot in width or that weight will be sent to pounds in weight; any packet exceedine

There must be no writing or printing on the packet or its cover in addition to the address of the person for whom the packet is intended except the address of the sender and the nature of the contents, trade mark and numbers, and the prices of the articles, otherwise the packet will be charged double letter postage.
