## CANTERBURY.

### NARRATIVE OF EVENTS FOR THE YEAR 1865.

In reviewing the events of the past year, it is necessary to glance at the position of the province towards the close of 1864. We had then just passed through a period of prosperity unexampled in our annals. The wise administration of our Waste Land Regulations had brought within our borders much of the capital attracted by the rich Goldfield, now on its wane, that exists in a neighbouring province. Our own resources, independent of this stimulus, had multiplied equal to the most sanguine expectations. At the time we are now speaking of, we found our population had doubled itself in three years. Our imports and exports exceeded in value those of any other province in New Zealand, save one, and we were possessed of a vast and unimpaired estate in waste lands, which seemed sufficient to guarantee the advancement of the province in a corresponding ratio for many years to come. With this prosperity, however, came requirements that, with a less rapid development, would not have been felt. Railways, secure harbours for shipping, expensive bridges, telegraphs, and other costly appliances of modern progress were deemed necessary, and their accomplishment undertaken and pushed forward with vigour. In the meantime the stagnation of commerce in England began to make itself felt. A ruinous native war obliged the General Government of New Zealand to force upon that market an immense amount of paper, offering greater profit to the speculator than the Provincial Government were willing to pay. The season was unpropitious; the capitalists of England confounded the unsubstantial security offered by the General Government with the more solid resources of our infant province; our loans became almost unnegotiable; our public works were impeded; and a season of mercantile depression has ensued which may now, at the present time, be considered at its extreme. But, notwithstanding these adverse circumstances, if we cannot congratulate ourselves on unmitigated prosperity, we may at least boast that, after all, the position of the province is as good as ever; our credit, shaken by circumstances over which we had no control, is being recognised where we most care that it should, and although extraordinary calls have been made upon the public purse during the past year, we have met them promptly, and can now look forward to a rich contrast to our past difficulties.

Two or three years ago the discovery of a rich goldfield in Otago gave rise to considerable discussion as to the probability and desirability of a similar source of wealth existing in Canterbury. The general opinion seemed to be, as far as we can gather, that Canterbury had no Goldfield, and that if she had it would be a misfortune rather than otherwise. We professed to be content with the indirect but considerable benefit derived from our neighbour's experience in that respect, without the expense of administration that such a discovery would entail upon us. This, however, did not prevent our coquetting with fortune. Liberal rewards were offered by Government and private parties for the discovery of a Canterbury Goldfield. A Geologist of repute was employed in vain searching for the precious metal; and when at length, in the early part of last year, it was proved beyond dispute that we possessed a Goldfield, which promised to exceed in richness any hitherto found in New Zealand, we resigned ourselves to our fate, and indulged in the most glowing anticipations of a golden future.

That our anticipations have not been exactly fulfilled is no fault of ours. No effort has been wanting to utilise the vast stores of wealth which have been opened on our western shores. An additional enormous expenditure has been saddled on the province by the late discovery, but it must be confessed as yet without

any adequate return. Works, whose magnitude are not equalled in the whole of New Zealand, have been inaugurated in order to connect the Goldfield with the eastern part of the province; an expenditure startling in the sum of its total is going on day after day, and must inevitably continue for many months, if not years to come, in the endeavour to bring nearer the auriferous and the agricultural districts; and this, too, when it was deemed almost impossible to meet the ordinary requirements of the province.

It may be truly said that never before has this province been placed in so critical a position. With no doubts as to the elasticity of its resources and its final prosperity, it would be unwise to shut our eyes to the fact that we are now arrived at a point when the utmost wisdom is required in those who have the direction of our affairs, and careful statesmanship alone can save us from being involved in the general bankruptcy which seems impending over the rest of the colony.

It is not our intention to discuss the manner in which the Maori war has been conducted; we can only stay to mention that so much dissatisfaction has been created by the proceedings in the North Island, that the project of Separation has been revived in the South by a body called the Middle Island Association, whose head-quarters are at Christchurch. They number several influential names in their ranks, have established a well-organised system of agitation, and entertain sanguine hopes of success.

The first great public work of the province was the Lyttelton and Christchurch Railway, which was commenced in July, 1861. Since that time a section of the railway has been in remunerative work, and the Moorhouse Tunnel, the main feature of this undertaking, has been progressing steadily. The hardness of the rock encountered has greatly impeded the work, but at the end of November we find that, out of a total length of 2834 yards, 1079½ yards have been driven from the Port side, and 1130½ yards from the Heathcote, leaving a balance of 615 yards yet to be driven before its completion, which is estimated to occupy from ten to eighteen months, according to the nature of stone met with.

The insecure state of Lyttelton harbour, which is the only outlet to the eastern part of the province, has long been a source of anxious consideration. Works involving a very large expenditure were recommended by a special commission of scientific gentlemen in England, to whom the matter was referred. The Government, while recognising their advisability, found themselves unable to proceed as recommended from want of funds. A modified plan has, however, been proceeded on. The old jetty is to be partially rebuilt and extended; a wharf and embankment are to be constructed from the railway embankment to the old jetty; a jetty is to be erected for the accommodation of steam lighters at the western end of the new jetty; and a stone breakwater is commenced at Officers Point, on the line recommended by the Harbour Commission. The estimated cost of the whole amounts to £40,000. With the exception of the breakwater, the works have been contracted for, the contractors accepting half-cash in payment, and the balance in 6 per cent. Provincial Debentures at par; the work to be completed by July, 1866.

On the 31st of March, the first lighthouse erected in Canterbury was in operation. It is on Godley Head, a bluff at the entrance of the harbour. The building is of stone; it stands at an elevation of 400 feet above the sea; it is 32 feet high, the light itself is 426 feet above the sea. It is cata-dioptic; the rays are diffused by a three-wick lamp, on the French moderator principle. The wicks are parallel, and transmitted to the line of the horizon by circular belts, or lenses, of thick glass. The lamp is self-acting, and requires very little attention; the lenses, being once fixed, can never be put out of order. The whole lighting apparatus is enclosed in a large glass lantern. The frame is of gun metal, and the panes, thirty-six in number, of plate-glass half-an-inch thick; the roof, gutters, and weathercock are all of copper; the lining of the roof, the railings, and pedestal plates being of iron. The stonework terminates in a cornice, on which the whole of the ironwork rests, being held down by Lewes bolts, and surrounded by an ornamental iron railing, for the convenience of the lightkeepers. The light is visible for thirty miles, in clear weather. The total cost of the works is about £3000.

During the year ending 31st December, 1864, the number of ships inwards to the port of Lyttelton was 97, of an aggregate tonnage of 37,791 tons, conveying 3250 passengers. The total value of imports in the same period was £853,434; exports, £406,301; the duty collected was £73,026 10s 4d. The returns for 1865 are not complete, but in round numbers the imports may be stated at £625,000; exports, £500,000; duty collected, £90,000. This is exclusive of the returns from Hokitika, the capital of the Goldfields, of which we shall speak at more length in another place. During the wool season ending May, 1865, there were exported from Canterbury 20,394 bales of wool and 5790 skins, of the declared value of £448,690, against 17,682 bales wool, 9984 skins, of the value of £411,442, exported in 1864.

The first sod of the Southern Railway, intended to connect the capital with Timaru and adjacent country, was turned on 24th May. The contract as far as the Rakaia, a distance of thirty miles, has been let to Messrs. Holmes and Co., the contractors for the Lyttelton and Christchurch line. This portion is to be completed in two years from date of commencement; the cost of the whole will be £200,000, the contractors to work the line six months after opening. The terms of payment are:—One-half in cash; one-quarter in debentures, at 90; and one-quarter in land, at £2 per acre.

An imposing suite of offices has been added to the Government Buildings at Christchurch. These comprise a new Council Chamber and refreshment rooms. They are built of stone, are of massive proportions, and are by far the finest buildings in Canterbury.

The other public works begun or proceeded with during the year, with the exception of those connected with the West Coast, are not of such an important character as to demand special notice. The Road Board

scheme is found to answer well, and, under the auspices of these bodies, the face of the country is gradually assuming a change for the better. A rather amusing contest took place between one Road Board and the constituents. The former had introduced a toll-bar on one of the roads under their control. The inhabitants of the district were violently opposed to this measure, and testified their feelings by small riots, which the obnoxious obstruction was twice demolished. A steady perseverance in their object, however, on the part of the Board, bore down opposition, and the Papanui toll-bar yet flourishes, a monument of the financial genius of the Avon Road Board.

Private enterprise has kept pace with the year. Many very fine places of business have been added to the buildings of the capital and country towns. Coming almost under the same denomination are two new stone churches in Christchurch. The Wesleyan church is a commodious and handsome structure, and credit to the body for whom it has been erected; the other, St. John's, Church of England, is a very pretty little building, of considerable architectural pretensions, conveniently situated in the eastern centre of the city. The experiment of paid sittings is to be tried here for the first time by the Church of England. It is necessary to add that both these buildings received liberal grants from Government towards the erection.

The first stone of the foundations of the Cathedral at Christchurch was laid with great solemnity on 16th December, 1864, the anniversary of the foundation of the province. The foundations have since been completed under the superintendence of a Resident Architect, brought out from England for that purpose, but at present no signs of further progress appear. This is owing to the general complaint—want of funds.

On December 13, 1864, Christchurch was first lighted with gas, introduced by a private company. Its use has become very general, and we believe it is paying in a commercial point of view.

The Volunteer movement has received an extraordinary impetus. This, we believe, has been caused by judicious action on the part of the Provincial Government and partly by a declaration on the part of the General Government of its intention of calling out the Militia. Many who had insuperable objections to being forced into service therefore preferred the alternative, and became enthusiastic volunteers. A commodious drill-shed has been erected in Christchurch at the expense of the Provincial Government; suitable arms have been provided also by them, and prizes have been offered to stimulate their efficiency. The causes combined have produced a result very satisfactory. We are at present possessed of a Volunteer force, respectable in numbers, equipment, and efficiency, and who seem thoroughly to believe in the importance of the movement. A novel feature in our volunteering has appeared during the past year. Encampments have been formed at Hillsborough, three miles distant from Christchurch, at which all the Volunteers of the province have been strongly represented, and which have been carried out to the credit, and the satisfaction of everybody concerned.

Immigration has not been so brisk as formerly. In view of the slackness of business, the Government exercised a wise discretion in restricting their operations in this department to a very limited number. It is found also, we imagine, that the time is approaching when this province must become independent of Government aid to swell our population. With the exception of one description of labour, it is a question worthy of consideration whether assisted immigration may not now be abandoned altogether. With our newly-found Goldfields, and those of our neighbours, it seems certain that our wants will be fully supplied without directly taxing our resources for that especial purpose. The exception alluded to is that of female domestics. Although, in this respect, the province is becoming in some measure self-productive, the influx of male population, and their general prosperity, demands a constant supply from without. This has been provided for. An advertisement announces that female domestics, of approved health and character, will be provided with free passages from England to Canterbury. For the information of those likely to avail themselves of this liberality, we may quote the wages obtained here, as published in the colony:—Housemaids, £30 to £35 per annum; cooks, £30 to £45; nursemaids, £25 to £30. Other descriptions of labour are at a corresponding ratio. Married couples (farming) obtain from £60 to £80 per annum, and rations: single men, £50 to £75, with rations; labourers, without rations, 6s to 8s per diem; mechanics, from 8s to 12s per diem. It must, however, be stated that, from various causes, the retail prices of provisions are as high or perhaps higher, than at any previous time for many years. We quote from published price currents:—Beef, 8d to 1s; mutton, 7d to 10d; pork, 8d to 9d; veal, 9d; butter (fresh), 1s 4d; milk, 2s per gallon; eggs, 1s 6d per dozen; bread, 1s 4 lbs.; potatoes, per cwt., 5s to 6s. These prices are quoted in December, in winter the dairy produce ranges much higher.

A census of the population in New Zealand, taken at the close of last year, gives the following results for Canterbury:—Males, 18,932; females, 13,321; total, 32,253, against 16,040 in 1861. Sheep, 1,567,320; horses, 10,868; cattle, 45,263. There were found to be 342,416 acres of ground fenced, of which 70,000 were under crop. These figures were, of course, before the Goldfield had been populated; and, indeed, everything we have hitherto spoken of relates only to East Canterbury.

In Provincial politics there has not been anything worth noticing, save the excitement caused by the approaching election for Superintendent. There are three candidates now canvassing votes for this office:—Mr. Moorhouse, formerly in office, Mr. Travers, and Mr. Lance. The former, from his tried ability and general popularity, seems the favourite. The same Executive has remained in office the whole of last year, with the exception of Mr. Rolleston, who, dissatisfied with the railway policy of the Executive, and having

an opportunity of transferring his services to the General Government, retired in June. He has been replaced as Provincial Secretary by Mr. Edward Jollie, who, like his predecessor, is a youthful politician, this being his introduction to public notice.

A Special Session of the Provincial Council was held from 30th May to 7th June; the business transacted was the sanctioning of the contract with Messrs. Holmes and Co., for the Southern Railway, in so far as the part payment in land was concerned, and the passing sufficient supplies to carry on the Government till the ordinary session, which was postponed till after the rising of the General Assembly. It is proper to notice the retirement of Mr. Charles Bowen from the Speakership—an office which he long held with universal approbation. Mr. John Ollivier, another well-known old servant of the province, was elected unanimously to the vacant chair.

The Council are again in session (end of December, 1865), but the business they are occupied with is so nearly confined to measures connected with the Goldfields, that it is necessary to speak more fully of the latter before proceeding further.

The West Coast of the Middle Island has been long known to be auriferous. The River Buller, in the province of Nelson, has even yielded gold in considerable quantities for some years, but not to a sufficient extent to create any considerable influx of population. It appears that some parties, whose business led them to the coast in the neighbourhood of the mouth of the Teramakau, were so convinced of the gold-bearing character of the district, that an expedition was fitted out specially for the purpose of testing the fact. This was shortly after the discovery of gold in Otago, and at a time when the Canterbury Government were offering a reward of £1000 for the discovery of a payable field in this province. The party sailed, and, after some time, forwarded a sample of gold to Christchurch, said to have been got at the place already mentioned. Their account was received with incredulity, and the reward was not awarded to them; indeed, no active steps were taken by the Government to prove the truth or otherwise of their claim. It is a singular fact that, though Canterbury was so anxious to have a goldfield of her own, yet the reports circulated by this party, and by many succeeding adventurers, were systematically ignored; people really would not believe in the possibility of their wishes being realised; and it must be confessed that the first development of the West Canterbury Goldfields was accomplished by the energy and capital of other provinces. Some explanation of this is to be found in the fact that the West Coast was, before this discovery, almost a *terra incognita*. Various efforts had been made on the part of Government to penetrate thither from the eastward, some of which were attended with eminently disastrous results; and at last it seemed conceded that, with the exception of the route by the water-courses of the Hurunui and Teramakau, no means existed by which communication could be carried on between the coasts. A superficial examination of the country had been made, but this to a very limited extent. The West Coast was believed to present a rock-bound and imperious shore, destitute of harbours, a region of perpetual storms, shunned by mariners, and impenetrable by land; where stupendous cliffs, crowned to their summits with dense forests of a strange vegetation, and washed at their base by fathomless waters, fringed an interior of snow-clad mountains and turbulent rivers, over which reigned a solitude broken only by the undisturbed cries of a thousand unknown birds. The natives inhabiting other parts of the island have weird and awful traditions connected with the West Coast. According to them, demons infest its mysterious solitudes, and vague histories are given of a tribe of wild Maoris, who, almost bereft of all resemblance to human beings, drag out a loathsome existence buried in its recesses. In short, twelve months ago, we knew as little of the country that is now teeming with population, as if it had been thousands of miles distant; and what was known only served to discourage the peaceful and unambitious trader, accustomed to the fertile plains and genial climate of Old Canterbury. It is as well to add here, that the large and increasing commerce that has followed the gold discovery has eluded the grasp of Canterbury merchants, and is now wholly in the hands of immigrants "who know us not;" for, while the old settlers were idly discussing the merits of this or that overland route, and calling on the Government to point out the way in which themselves should be enriched, outsiders poured in goods by sea, notwithstanding the bad character of the coast, and completely shut that market to its legitimate providers.

The first rush took place in January-February to the Greenstone Creek, or Hohonu river, a tributary of the Teramakau; the finds there were of sufficient promise to attract a large number of diggers from the adjacent provinces; and when their researches were rewarded by the discovery of the precious metal at the Waimea, Kanieri, Hokitika, Totara, Wanganui, Mikonui, and numberless nameless streams, the fame of the new diggings produced the usual results, and a flood of immigration from the other colonies set in, which is still pouring in population with extraordinary rapidity. Latterly the coast further to the north has proved very rich in gold, and it is now known that, from the River Grey, north, to Bruce's Bay, south—an extensive district—is one vast goldfield.

The quantity of gold exported from its first discovery to the 30th November, is 187,560 ozs., value about £750,000. The revenue accruing from this source is £23,500; the period over which the export extended was eight months. The population of the goldfields may, in the absence of official returns, be estimated at 30,000, or about the same as the eastern portion of the province possesses, and it is probable that in six months the population will have doubled itself.

As we have before hinted, the importance of the discovery was at first hard to realise. Warned by the delusive character of similar discoveries in neighbouring provinces, the Government left the matter very much to itself. It is true that, slightly moved by the languid stimulants administered by their

constituents, they expended two or three hundred pounds in improving the Hurunui route, and caused the destitute state of the intervening country to be advertised; but for a long time no other steps were taken. At last, however, it became evident that the case was too urgent to admit of further delay, and reconnoitring parties were sent out in every direction, with the hope that some more favourable route would be found than the one already known. It was at that time supposed that if a dray road could be constructed between the coasts, the whole of the traffic necessary to the new country would flow through that channel. The Government now seemed in earnest, and spared no expense in the requisite direction. An amateur party, even, who have since become historical under the title of the "pic-nic," were subsidized and otherwise assisted in their ardent search for a practicable pass through the dividing range, which, however, in their case, was without result. The Chamber of Commerce also offered a liberal reward, under some restrictions, for the same service, but also without result. The Government were, however, more fortunate; for, after much preliminary examination, it was finally announced that a pass, first discovered by Mr. Arthur Dobson, via the Upper Waimakariri, the Bealey and Otira, had been found to present the most advantageous, or rather the least difficult, line for a dray road across the island. On this determination, the greatest energy was displayed to make it available; and although commenced in the middle of winter, and carried on in an almost inaccessible country, destitute of supplies of any kind, the work has proceeded steadily, and at the time of writing is completed for two-thirds of the distance. It is almost impossible in a brief sketch to give any adequate idea of the difficult nature of this work. The road from Hokitika to Christchurch—the *termini*—is about 160 miles long; for 90 miles of that distance it passes over a succession of lofty mountains, precipitous ravines and dangerous rivers; portions of it are carried through tangled forests and swamps, which present engineering difficulties even more troublesome than the former portion. For 60 miles not a blade of grass is met with; nothing but rocks and hills piled up in inextricable confusion, single beds, forest and rivers. And these are not all. Here the traveller finds himself in a region of almost perpetual storms; it is no exaggeration to assert that, nine months out of the year, it rains without cessation, and all the phenomena of the elements are exhibited on a scale rarely witnessed elsewhere.

Another route, by the Rakain, has also been discovered, and in some quarters was looked upon with much favour. The Government have spent a considerable sum in the endeavour to make it available; but, from more extended experience, it does not seem likely, from its great altitude, to be of much practical use except for driving over stock.

The greatest centre of population at the West Coast is Hokitika, which is situated at the mouth of the river of that name. It has a dangerous bar harbour, where, in its early days, an extraordinary loss of vessels and property took place; as, however, the place has become better known, and the navigation improved, the casualties have almost entirely ceased, and Hokitika at present imports nearly the whole of the supplies for the West Coast: its population is estimated at 7000. Greymouth, on the River Grey, 21 miles north of Hokitika, may be called the northern centre; it is in the midst of very rich diggings, has a bar harbour similar to Hokitika, though of less capacity, and rivals Hokitika in population, which may be put down at 4,500. Waimea, nine miles N.E., Totara, Okarita, Mikonui, and Bruce Bay, south of Hokitika, are also flourishing diggings; in fact, it is harder to say where the ground in this favoured country is not auriferous than the contrary.

This addition to the magnitude of the province threw a sudden burden on the Government, which brings us again to the transactions of the present session of the Provincial Council. We find that the estimated expenditure for the goldfields, in the financial (present) year 1865-6, is £170,392; the estimated receipts are £172,400; and for the other part of the province—Expenditure, £486,030; receipts, £514,795. Total for general account—Expenditure, 656,431; receipts, £687,195. Though these amounts may be modified, the result will not be wide of the figures given.

A rather important proposition will be submitted by the Education Commission, viz., the establishment of high class schools, endowed by Government with waste lands. It is only sought to establish one at present; it is to be in the country, and to be connected with a farm, where farming and agricultural chemistry may be taught. The scheme is looked on with favour, and will probably be brought into operation. The adjustment of the claims of the various sections of the province on the general land fund, and the construction of machinery for the proper government of the new portion of the province, will be the chief employment of the Council the remainder of the session; and let us hope at their next meeting the wise measures passed now will have borne fruit, and tended to produce a healthier state of affairs generally than exists at present.

We have been pleased to watch the gradual opening up of another source of industry in this province—namely, the Canterbury Colliery, on the Kowai. Good and cheap fuel is sure to give an impetus to any new country; and this essential commodity exists, we are assured, in the province, to an extent little dreamed of. The workings of the above-named Colliery are, under the direction of the proprietor, conducted on the most approved principles, being well ventilated, and the water carried off by a drive a little above the water level of the river. The outlying districts already reap the advantage of cheap coal. It has been sold at the pit's mouth during the whole of the present year at twenty shillings per ton. Should the Railway or a Tramway be continued from Rolleston Station, on the Southern line, to the mines, then the price of coal in Christchurch would be reduced one-half or more. Every doubt now being removed as to the existence, capacity, and availability of these mines, time and circumstance will develop the resource to the advantage of the whole community.

The Interprovincial Telegraph has been opened during the year from the Bluff, at the extreme South, to Picton, in Cook's Straits. The first message was received in Christchurch from the Bluff and Dunedin on the 22nd of May, since which time the line has been in good working order. The Northern section, as far as Picton, has only just been opened, and the section which will complete the work to Nelson will most probably be opened in the middle of January.

The construction of a telegraph to the West Coast has been commenced by the Provincial Government. The line is complete and in operation to the Bealey, where a station has been built. From this point the erection of the line is being carried on under considerable difficulties, from the rugged nature of the ground to be traversed, and the number of rivers and creeks which have to be crossed. However, the wire is being rapidly pushed on to Hokitika, and by the time this is in the hands of our readers, Christchurch will be in direct communication with the Goldfields.

### THE DISEASED CATTLE ACT.

The powers of the Governor under this Act are now delegated to the Superintendent of Canterbury, and he has, by Proclamation dated November 27th, 1865, declared the Colonies of New South Wales, Tasmania, Victoria, Queensland, South Australia, Western Australia, the Cape of Good Hope, and the Islands of Great Britain and Ireland, to be infected districts. Another proclamation bearing the same date appoints all that portion of the Province of Canterbury to the West of the Dividing Range, to be a quarantine ground under the said Act. Cattle from these infected districts may therefore be landed on the quarantine ground, under the following regulations:—

1. If any person shall import any cattle from either or any of the said infected districts, into the Colony of New Zealand, unless upon quarantine ground, and after having obtained from an Inspector of Cattle a quarantine certificate, he shall be liable to a penalty of fifty pounds for every head of cattle so imported into the Colony of New Zealand.
2. If any person shall land, or cause to be landed, or assist in landing any cattle coming from either of the said infected districts in or upon any part of the Colony of New Zealand, unless upon a quarantine ground, and after having obtained a quarantine certificate, he shall be liable to a penalty of fifty pounds for every head of cattle so landed.
3. It shall be lawful for, and the duty of any Inspector of Cattle, or Police Constable to destroy, or cause to be destroyed, any cattle which shall be imported or landed contrary to these regulations.
4. If any person shall wilfully impede or obstruct any Inspector of Cattle, or any Police Constable acting under the authority of these regulations, every person so offending shall and may be seized and detained by such person so acting as aforesaid, or any person or persons he may call to his assistance, until such offender or offenders can be taken before two Justices of the Peace, and shall be liable to a penalty of fifty pounds.

The Provinces of Otago, Southland, Taranaki, and Auckland are also declared infected districts, and the regulations applying to these are as under:—

1. If any person shall import, drive, or remove, or cause to be imported, driven, or removed, or assist in driving or removing any cattle from either of the said infected districts into the Province of Canterbury, except upon quarantine ground, and the authority of a quarantine certificate, such person shall be liable to penalty of fifty pounds for every head of cattle so imported, driven, or removed.
2. It shall be lawful for any Inspector of Cattle, or Police Constable to destroy, or cause to be destroyed, any cattle which shall pass into this Province from either of the said districts contrary to these regulations.
3. If any person shall wilfully impede or obstruct any Inspector, or any Police Constable acting under the authority of these regulations, every person so offending shall and may be seized and detained by such person so acting as aforesaid, or any person or persons he may call to his assistance, until such offender or offenders can be taken before two Justices of the Peace, and shall be liable to a penalty of fifty pounds.

Letters sent to or by seamen and soldiers in Her Majesty's service will be transmitted within the Colony, and between the Colony and any post-office in the British dominions, at a charge of 1d., provided that the following regulations are observed:—

Each letter must not be more than half an ounce in weight.

It must be superscribed with the name of the writer, description or class in the vessel or regiment, and signed by the officer at the time in command.

Postage must be prepaid.

Letters on the public service of Her Majesty's naval and military forces are exempted from the payment of postage, if bearing the words "On Her Majesty's Service," and the signature of the officer in command of the force on the service of which the letter is despatched.

Letters on the public service of the General Government of the Colony are transmitted free by post, if bearing the words "On the public service only," and the signature of an officer of the General Government authorised to frank official letters.

REGISTRATION FEE.

NEWSPAPERS.

Sent free to any part of the Colony, if published therein, and posted within seven days from publication.

If not published in the Colony, or not posted within seven days from publication, one penny.

To the United Kingdom, via Marseilles, 3d. each.

To the continent of Europe, via Trieste, 2d. each.

BOOK-PACKETS.

For the United Kingdom, via Southampton, and from one part of the Colony to another, not exceeding 4 ozs. in weight, 4d.; exceeding 4 ozs. and not exceeding 8 ozs., 8d.; exceeding 8 ozs. and not over 1 lb., 1s. 4d., and 8d. for every additional half-pound or fraction of half-a-pound.

The above rates are doubled to the United Kingdom via Marseilles.

REGULATIONS.

All letters, packets, and newspapers, if liable to postage, posted in New Zealand, must be prepaid by affixing postage labels of the Colony of sufficient value.



GENERAL GOVERNMENT ELECTRIC TELEGRAPH.

REGULATIONS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH TELEGRAMS MAY BE TRANSMITTED ON THE LINES OF ELECTRIC TELEGRAPH BELONGING TO THE GENERAL GOVERNMENT OF NEW ZEALAND.

1. FORM OF TELEGRAM.—All ordinary Telegrams must be written in ink, on the printed forms supplied by the department for the purpose, and all Telegrams must be signed by the sender.

Telegraph Officers are at liberty to refuse the transmission of any Telegrams that do not strictly comply with these regulations.

2. CHARGES OF TELEGRAMS.—Telegrams will be charged at the Tariff rates published from time to time by authority of the Postmaster-General.

All ordinary Telegrams must be prepaid.

When the sender of a Telegram desires it, he may prepay the reply to his Telegram, and the messenger will wait not longer than five minutes for such prepaid reply. Should the sender of a Telegram desire to have his Telegram repeated back, to insure accuracy, such repetition will be made at half the charge of the original Telegram.

3. TRANSMISSION OF TELEGRAMS.—Ordinary Telegrams will be transmitted in the order in which they are received from the public. Special Telegrams on the public service, and those admitted as urgent, being Telegrams forwarded on pressing emergencies, such as accidents and cases of illness, take the precedence of ordinary Telegrams.

4. TELEGRAMS IN CYPHER.—Telegrams may be transmitted in cypher, which will be counted according to the following scale:—Separate cyphers count as one word; groups of five cyphers, or fractional parts of five cyphers, count as one word. Groups exceeding five cyphers are counted at the rate of five cyphers to the word. Any fractional portion remaining to be counted as a word. Note.—Where cyphers are used, the sender is recommended to pay for the repetition of the Telegram, to insure accuracy in the transmission.

5. DELIVERY OF TELEGRAMS.—Telegrams will be delivered free of charge within the towns in which the stations are situated. But when the Telegrams have to be delivered beyond the boundary of such towns, an additional charge will be made, to defray the expenses of portage or postage, as the case may be.

6. RESPONSIBILITY.—The Government will not be held responsible for errors, omissions, or delays in the transmission of Telegrams, nor for the non-transmission of any Telegram, nor for delays in the delivery, nor for the non-delivery of any Telegram, from whatever causes the same may arise.

All Telegrams will be held strictly confidential.

## RULE FOR COMPUTING OVERPROOFS ON SPIRITS, IN CASKS CONTAINING TWENTY GALLONS AND OVER.

MULTIPLY the number of gallons by the strength per cent.; set off the decimal point, and divide by 100; the remainder will give the number of gallons of overproof to be added to the liquid quantity.

No duty is to be charged upon any fractional part of a gallon, on the strength of spirits, unless it amounts to 84-100th parts; but any fraction exceeding that to be charged with duty as a gallon.

FIND the decimal for the number of gallons in the following table, which place beside the number of gallons; then multiply by the strength per cent.; set off the decimal point, and divide by 10; the whole number remaining will be tenths of a gallon.

NOTE.—In charging the overproof on spirits in ullage casks, &c., no charge must be made unless it amounts to one-tenth of a gallon, and that one-tenth must be complete, viz., 9-100th parts not being charged as one-tenth.

These are the denominations of Troy weight where used for weighing gold, silver, and precious stones (except diamonds). But Troy weight is also used by apothecaries in compounding medicines, and by them the ounce is divided into 8 drams, and the dram into 3 scruples, so that the scruple is equal to 20 grains. For scientific purposes the grain only is used; and sets of weights are constructed in decimal progression, from 10,000 grains downward to 1-100th part of a grain.

The carat, used for weighing diamonds, is 3 grains and 1-6th. The term, however, when used to express the fineness of gold, has a relative meaning only. Every mass of alloyed gold is supposed to be divided into 24 square parts; thus the standard for coin is 22 carats fine, that is, it consists of 22 parts of pure gold, and 2 parts of alloy.
