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12. Artillery-observation stations are just as important as the guns- and must be equally well concealed. They must be approached by covered communications, and the personnel must never be seen to walk into them as has frequently been the case..
13. Artillery forward observing stations must be carefully prepared before occupation, the infantry being responsible for the necessary work. They must be provided with efficient head cover and, when possible shields should be improvised.
14. The same remarks about concealment apply equally to bodies of troops in rear, whether within artillery range of the enemy or not. The enemy is always on the alert to ascertain our dispositions and the position of our reserves and these must not be given away. Strict discipline in this matter must be enforced. The excellence of the discipline of the enemy in this matter is outstanding reproof to us.
15. The same applies, in some degree, to Depots of supplies and ammunition, which must be concealed as far as possible, and only approached under cover of darkness.
16. All troops, whether in first or second line, or in reserve, will detail parties daily to search for snipers in the vicinity of their lines. There are many of these about and they have caused heavy losses in officers and others.
