Te Hāpua: Halswell Centre is a new library and community facility being built alongside the Halswell Aquatic Centre site. The complex, fronting onto Halswell Road, will create a hub for the rapidly-growing Halswell community.

University of Canterbury photo programme

Christchurch City Libraries has teamed up with the University of Canterbury to create a photographic documentary project, The Halswell Project, which will take a snapshot of what the community looks like in post-quake Christchurch.

Mitchell Bright, Ellie Waters and Nick Glen are studying documentary photography at the School of Fine Arts and have been busy walking the Halswell streets, meeting locals and taking photographs in order to produce a documentary record of the area. These images will be included in the Christchurch City Libraries Digital Heritage Collection and will also form a digital exhibition that will be shown at Te Hāpua: Halswell Centre throughout December.

The photos so far have been striking – some will be on display at the current Halswell Library from mid-June, so stroll down and have a look.

Construction update

- The north car park and the tree planting have been completed. Work on the south car park is underway.
- The skeleton of the facility is there – all of the structural steel and roof framing has gone up and is being painted.
- The roofing is being installed.
- The concrete block walls are being laid.
- The first glazing to the aluminium windows is being installed.

What's next?

Over the next month, as well as continuing with the roof, the concrete block walls and the aluminium windows, we'll be framing the timber external and internal walls, installing the fire sprinkler pipework and wiring (fire alarm, electrical, security and data) and starting to install the plumbing pipework.
